

Cleanup Week Starts Monday

Cascade Locks will have its first Cleanup Week, beginning next Monday as decreed by the city council. A dumping ground for all rubbish has been obtained just six-tenths of a mile from the Columbia river highway near the government emergency landing field east of town. Directions to get there are: turn right on Herman road, a short distance past Columbia Gorge district ranger station; take the first right-hand road leading off Herman road and signs will direct you to the dump, back of the Harris property.

Mayor Charles Nelson is taking personal charge of rehabilitation of the cemetery, discovered to be city property a few weeks ago. He and a committee will catalogue the names of those buried there and contact their descendants for small donations to clean the grounds and erect a fence and short road.

The city council is calling all residents to clean up their property, burning all slashings and weeds to eliminate a bad fire hazard.
