EXPERT FLYCASTER TO GIVE FREE INSTRUCTION

B. B. Perrows, one of the best know fly and bait casters in the United States, will give free casting instruction on the dam reservation as part of Izaak Walton league day, May 11, Fred McGee, Izaak Walton league president, announced this week.

The new club will celebrate its recent organization with banquet the same evening.

Mr. Perrows holds the national record of 99.14 feet for fly casting and tied the 1935 world records for both the 3/4 and 5/8 ounce fly weights. His schedule of instruction is planned so men on all shifts will be able to take it in.

RANGER TELLS ORIGIN OF DAM AREA'S NAMES

The Chronicle, through courtesy of Ranger Albert Wiesendanger of Eagle creek station, presents for the next few weeks interesting facts on the origin of many of the names of mountains, creeks, falls and other points of interest in the dam area. Mr. Wiesendanger has been checking local names for accuracy of origin for several years. Many of the following descriptions were taken from "Oregon Geographic Names," by Lewis A. McArthur.

Bonneville

This is an historic spot in Oregon, and for many decades it has been a popular picnic grounds for the people living along the Columbia river between Portland and The Dalles. The railroad company maintained an "eating house" at Bonneville where tired travelers paid a modest sum for all they could eat. The station was named for Captain (later brigadier-general) Benjamin L. E. Bonneville, hero of Washington Irving's "The Adventures of Captain Bonneville." He was born in France in 1795, was graduated from West Point military academy and fought with gallantry through the Mexican war. He explored the west from 1832-5, and visited many parts of Oregon. He seems to have been the first white man to go into the Wallowa country. He died in 1878.

Bradford Island

This island in the Columbia river (site of Bonneville dam) is easily seen from the railroad or highway just east of Bonneville. It was named for Daniel F. and Putnam Bradford, brothers, pioneer steamboat operators on the Columbia river. Among other things, they rebuilt the portage railroad at the Cascades in 1856. Later another portage road was built on the south side of the river, and eventually both were absorbed by the Oregon Steam Navigation company.

Munra Point

Munra point is just south of Bonneville, between Tanner and Moffett creeks. Munra point was named in 1915 in honor of "Grandma Munra," who for many years operated the railroad eating house at Bonneville and later at Meacham. She was a widely known pioneer woman, and her name was attached to the point in question by a committee representing various Oregon historical organizations. The name has been approved by the U. S. Geographic board.

'PEEPING TOM' SCARES DAM AREA RESIDENTS

Fear that a maniac was loose in the dam area was expressed this week by a number of residents after householders in Cascade Locks, Bonneville, Bonny Villa and North Bonneville reported a man trying to enter their homes late at night.

Mrs. Kirk Ruthroth of Cascade Locks screamed at 3 a. m. Sunday when she saw a man halfway through her bedroom window. Mr. Ruthroth jumped out of bed but could not identify the figure as it fled. He plans to have a gun by his bedside from now on.

Ed. Bowes of Bonny Villa was one of several who reported seeing a similar man trying to force entrance to their homes. From North Bonneville, across the river, come reports of similar activities, and state police believe the prowler to be the same man in each place.

DEER-CHASING DOGS TO GO, SAY SPORTSMEN

Dogs who chase deer are going to have a tough time from now on if the newly-organized Izaak Walton league at the dam has anything to say about it.

The league, at its last week's meeting, began formulation of a campaign to curb the deer-running tendencies of dogs in the dam area. President Fred McGee pointed to the large number of the graceful animals killed monthly at Tanner creek, where they jump over the cliffs rather than be torn to pieces by a pack of dogs.

The group stated that dogs can be trained not to chase deer. The league is endeavoring to obtain the co-operation of various state and county agencies to reduce the annual toll. They will publish an open letter to the public in next week's issue of The Chronicle.
