DOG LICENSES TO BE ENFORCED AS DEADLINE PASSES

All canine charges in and around Cascade Locks must be under license during the next week or Colon Merrill, city marshal, will be forced to make the erring dogs guests of the county and the owners will be subjected to fine from both city and county officials.

Teunis Wyers, city attorney, in explaining the ordinance now in effect concerning the licensing of dogs in the city, asked for support in the issue from the people of the district who own and prize their pets. The license will cover both city and county requirements and pet owners are asked to secure a license for their dogs, if they have not already done so, from W. Carlson, recorder, at the Craigmont hotel.

As a part of general business brought up during the course of Monday night's regular meeting of the city council, the matter of cleaning up the city was discussed. Several dumps in and around the residential districts and business centers have become unpleasantly noticeable and means are being considered to remove same under the power invested in the city government by the ordinance covering garbage and rubbish disposal.

All cans and other refuse, now piled in brush heaps around the city are to be cleaned up by a crew of men and a truck and charged to the owners of the property in the event the owners do not remove same themselves. Another week's lee-way has been allowed for property owners to clean up these objectionable piles.

Owners who intend to clean up their property will be directed to the city garbage dump by arrows and signs now posted on the Herman road near the emergency airport east of town.

The lighting committee headed by W. H. Clark, reports equipment or-

dered and on the way from the distributors from whom it was recently purchased. Some wires have already been strung and the promise is made that the city will soon have cause for celebration with light in the business and residential districts. By motion of Max Millsap, city recorder Carlson has been authorized to purchase a desk for his use wherein may be filed and kept such records of the city's business as lies in his domain. A need has long been felt for some suitable place for filing records and the council has authorized him to make the purchase not to exceed the sum of \$50. Further business pending decision was put over to next Monday night.
