Perrows has tied three world's records in both fly and bait casting and has been an instructor throughout Oregon and Washington for the past 12 years and more.

It has been whispered by admiring fishermen, that Perrows has so perfected his art that his fly actually makes a buzzing sound as it whistles out to the stream, and fish who have been lured by semi-experts and consider themselves well versed in the arts and wiles of the anxious nimrod, fall "hook, line and sinker".

RAILROAD GRADE IN SHAPE FOR BALLAST AND RAIL LAYING

Orino, Birkemeier & Sareman, contractors for the re-location of the Union Pacific main line around the dam, neared final operations this week with ballast laid along most of the new right-of-way and track laying in progress upon graded sections.

No ballast has been laid along the section west of Eagle creek which includes the tunnel, but work is due to start there towards the end of this week or the first of next. Elaborate preparations are necessary to make the rock ballast ready for dumping. Repeated washings have been tried to take the dirt out of the rock and last week saw two high-powered pumps brought into operation.

The new railroad depot nears completion with shingles and siding being placed this week. Interior fixtures will make this station one of the best appointed in its class along the line. A bunk house of railroad employees is also nearing finishing stages and will conform in architectural style to the depot.

Forms were in place and an elevator rigged to pour concrete in the base of the new water tower location. The tank will rest on a concrete foundation located high on the side of Lancaster cut in a niche prepared at the west entrance. It will be the customary wooden tank such as is in use at present at the depot along the present main line.

Engineers stated this week that at the present rate of progress, trains may expect to find a clear track along the new right-of-way around the last of May or the first part of June. Whether the regular trains will be switched over the new route at that time is not yet known.
