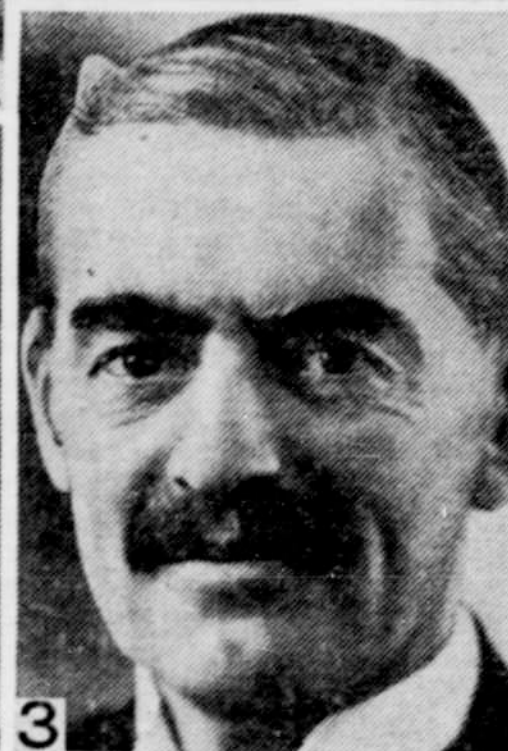
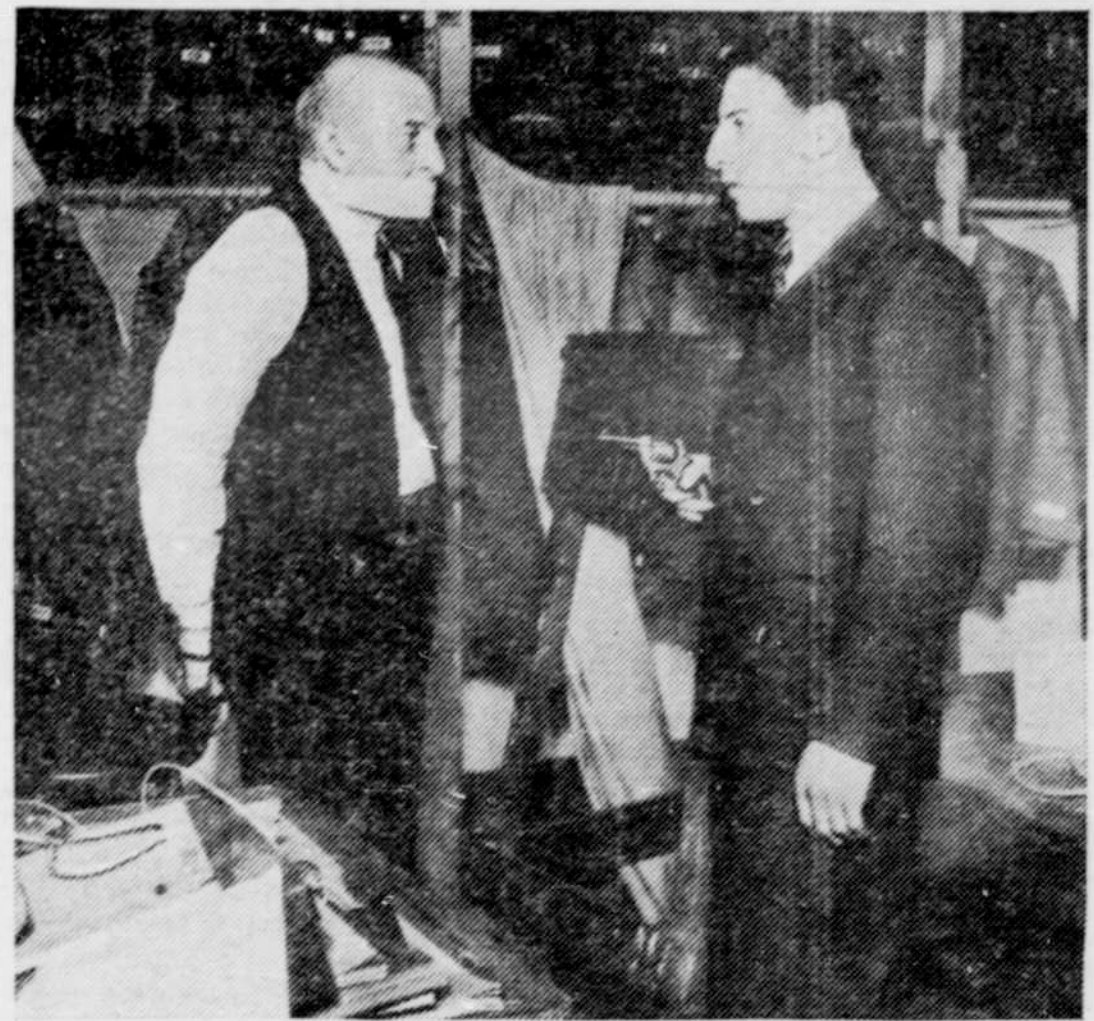

Overtime Parking Shown Up by Use of Peanuts

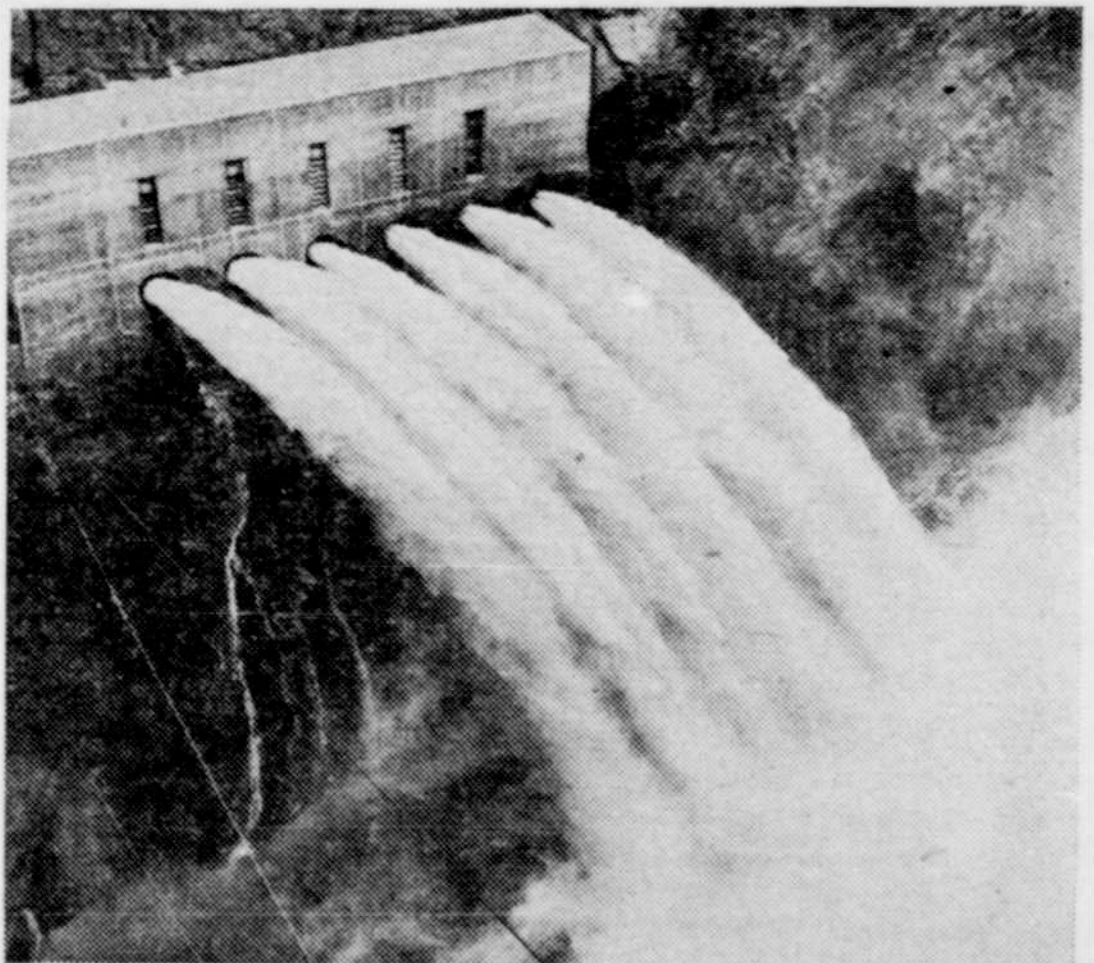
San Jose, Calif.—The peanut has taken its place alongside the magnifying glass, the lie detector and other implements for the detection of offenders, it was revealed here.
