

VFW LEADER WILL SPEAK TO NATION IN TOKYO CITY

Veterans of Foreign Wars will be given the opportunity to hear their commander-in-chief, James E. Van Zandt, address his fellow members over a world-wide hook-up with the National Broadcasting company Friday, May 15, when he will talk as part of the goodwill program from a radio station in Tokyo, Japan.

Commander Van Zandt is heading a goodwill delegation of the VFW, now touring through the Japanese dominions, and will be heard over the NBC and affiliated stations between the hours of 3:15 p.m. and 8:20 p.m. Pacific Standard time.

His talk will in general cover the progress being made by the nations of the world towards international peace and the security of economic venture.

Moe, present incumbent, has for long been a successful fruit grower in the region and will truly represent the interests of the district on the commission. In addition, James R. C. D. Nickelsen appears on the ballot as republican candidate for congress to represent the second Oregon district. Nickelsen is a pioneer resident of Hood River and is an in-dorsee of the Townsend Plan.

For the legislature, D. L. Pierson has the field to himself as has P. J. Stadelman of Wasco county for joint senator. Stadelman served out the unexpired term of Hal E. Hoss as secretary of state upon Hoss's death.
