

LEGAL ADVERTISING ORDINANCE 17

An Ordinance Regulating the Auditing, Allowance and Payment of Claims for Special Purposes and Repealing Section 3 of Ordinance No. 5 . . .

BE IT ORDAINED by the Common Council of the City of Cascade Locks:

Sec. 1- All claims and demands against the City not provided for by Section 2 of Ordinance No. 5 shall be examined by the finance committee in accordance with Section 7 of Ordinance No. 1, and after the allowance of any such claim or demand, the Recorder shall draw a warrant upon the Treasurer for the sum, which said warrant shall be countersigned by the Mayor and shall spec-The old town will be brighter from ify for what purpose the same is

Sec. 2- Section 3 of Ordinance No. 5 is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3- Inasmuch as the orderly and prompt payment of all the just claims against the City of Cascade Locks is essential to the credit and financial standing of the City and said claims and demands cannot be promptly paid without the immediate enactment of this ordinance, an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a three-fourths vote of all of the members of the city council and its publication as required by law and its approval by the Mayor.
