TURBINES TO GET NEW GATES SOON

Installation of steel latch dogs for controlling three roller wheel gates and four sliding gates in the turbine units of the Bonneville dam power house is being made currently, and the gates themselves, which will control flow of water through the turbine pits, will go in shortly.

Concrete stoplogs which eventually will form a permanent barrier and raise the waterhead above the turbines will be rigged to permit greater temporary flow through the power house, if necessary, while the north channel is blocked off during construction of the dam unit later on. The concrete stoplogs will not be installed for several weeks.

Draft tube stoplogs, included in the contract, will be laid some time after the others have been dropped into place.

In order that the Worden-Allen company, Milwaukee, Wis., contractors for installation of the draft tube gates, might use the 300-ton gantry crane necessary for placing the gate parts, the General-Shea company discontinued night shifts Tuesday. The crane, towering 78 feet above the 90-deck of the power house, interferes with operation of the highline cableway, and officials fear the electrical hazard of carrying on both activities simultaneously. Worden-Allen will work the night shift and General-Shea the day.
