At the Theatre

Days of the cattle rustlers may be gone, but days when tales of their exploits and the exploits of men who fight them fail to find audience are not yet with us. So you lovers of westerns, of spitting six-guns and hard-riding heroes, will want to see "Drift Fence," Zane Grey's screen romance coming to the Roosevelt theater Friday and Saturday, June 12 and 13.

In principal roles are Larry "Buster" Crabbe, erstwhile Tarzan, champion swimmer and tough guy in his own right; Katherine DeMille, beautiful and talented actress; Tom Keene, well-known fair-haired boy of desert sand movies, and Bennie Baker, comic riot.

"Drift Fence" dramatizes the conflict between the big and small ranch owners, when all land was considered common property for grazing purposes. A gang of rustlers wants to retain free run of a large ranch, and gets a young cowman to help them prevent the ranch owner from fencing his property. The young fellow discovers he has been duped, and makes things hot for the boys who were trying to put it over on him.

The film is spiced with plenty of fist-fights, pistol-fights, horse-bucking and stampedes. It'll leave you with the scent of corral-dust in your nostrils and the cowboy's "Yippee!" loud in your ears.

Come prepared with a couple of hankies and plenty of aspirin tablets when you see Harold Lloyd in "The Milky Way," at the Roosevelt theater Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, June 14-16.

No foolin', we'll stake our reputation that Harold is as good in this picture as he has ever been, and that that's laying it on thin. "When you see the sportive young blade leap blithely over a garden hedge, all jittery with the pangs of first love, and go "plop" in a pool of water, you'll have some idea of real comedy. When you see Harold fluttering about in a boxing ring, knocking out tough mugs with consummate ease, you'll have more of an idea. But to learn to what lengths comedy can go you'll have to see the whole show, because they try everything in the book at least once, and don't hesitate to try it twice if they think it's good.

Other players are Adolphe Menjou, who surprised us as a comedian; Menjou's wife, Verree Teasdale; Dorothy Wilson, Helen Mack, George Barbier, William Gargan and Lionel Stander.

An entirely new George Arliss waits for you in "Mr. Hobo," Gaumont-British production coming to the Roosevelt theater Wednesday and Thursday, June 17 and 18.

Arliss himself chose this production as his next after "Cardinal Richelieu," as he does not like his work to follow a single pattern too closely.

The story, against a French background, concerns a rovable vagabond whom circumstances elevate to prosperity, through no effort of his own. As a bank president he pines away and regains his happiness only by giving up his life of ease for the old accustomed hardships of tramping.
