NELSON EPPING, MILL- SAP MAY FEEL THE AX

cities of 75,000, which states that after the council has approved and ordered payment on certain bills, the recorder shall draw a warrant for their payment, the mayor shall countersign such warrant, and the treasurer shall issue a check against it.

To date Mayor Nelson has not signed the warrants, maintaining he would be stepping beyond his authority, since a suit to restrain the city from issuing bonds which provided funds against which the warrants are drawn is pending in the state supreme court.

Councilman Millsap presented in detail the position of himself and Councilman Epping, explaining that they had acted with reliable counsel from the start, with full concurrence of the council, and were backed up by a 4-to-1 vote of the people in issuing the bonds. He said there had been charges of skulduggery in connection with the contract the city made with Dale Haskins, who had filed ahead of the city for water rights in Dry creek, but pointed out that the city had satisfied Haskins, got what rights it needed and obtained PWA approval of the Haskins contract. Millsap's talk was applauded.

Mrs. A. Alger, a member of the audience, rose to say she thought there ought to be some way of settling the injunction suit and getting the contractor paid off without the city's becoming involved in any more suits, and drew a laugh when she added she thought she could figure out as good a way as any lawyer could.

Following the regular business of the meeting Councilman Millsap requested Mayor Nelson to grant 10 minutes' recess. During the recess councilmen decided on a course of action which strengthened the hand of advocates of payment of the water system warrants. When the council reconvened Councilman Jim Merrill introduced a resolution calling for a vote of confidence on the part of the council in the finance committee, of which Millsap and Epping, up for recall, are members, and the vote carried unanimously, six to none. Merrill himself is a member of the finance committee but was appointed after the original application to PWA had been filed.

Attorney Wyers gave a long review of negotiations on the Haskins contract just before the meeting ended, stating it as his personal opinion that the city was fortunate to bargain with Haskins in such a way that Haskins remains protected against water shortage while relinquishing his sole right in Dry creek following government claims.

As a sidelight on the question, the bond of Mrs. Vera Sprague, city treasurer was increased from \$1000 to \$25,000 for a 90-day period, at her own request. She felt that with \$31,000 in the bank subject to her signature both she and the city should be more adequately protected.

A resolution was also passed requiring that the recorder with the approval of the treasurer should countersign all warrants drawn against the construction fund.
