A thrilling struggle between red men and white for the possession of a hidden mine provides the plot for "Desert Gold," coming to the Roosevelt theater in Bonneville Friday and Saturday, July 3 and 4.

Full of splendid photography and extravagant costuming of the Indians for their ritual, the film, based on Zane Grey's novel of the same name, has more to offer than the ordinary western picture.

The part of the newly-inducted Indian chieftain who is responsible for the protection of the mine, the existence of which is known only to the tribe, is played by Larry "Buster" Crabbe. Tom Keene takes the part of the young mining engineer who is engaged by a black-hearted white man to learn the location of the mine so it might be taken forcefully from the reds.

Keene is won over to the Indians' side when he discovers the white gang torturing Crabbe (Moya), whom they have kidnapped. From that point on it is nip and tuck between the two factions for possession of the mine.

A comparative newcomer to the screen is lovely Marsha Hunt, who plays the part of Jane Belding, the villain's erstwhile fiancee who falls in love with Keene.
