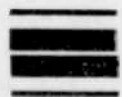
Surprise Party Held

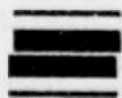

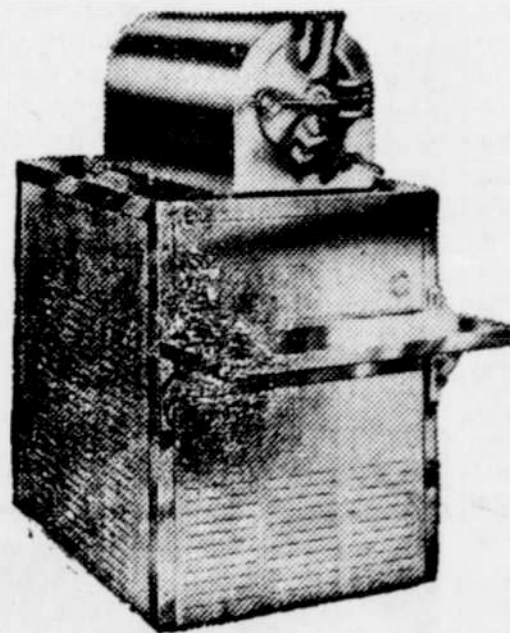
