WEDGE CRIB AID TO FACE-LIFTING

Looking toward early unwatering of the site of the north spillway dam construction workmen this week were erecting a wedge-shaped crib along the face of cribs 28 and 28-A, which are tilted downstream at the top because of hasty seating during high water.

The new supplementary crib will reach a point at or near the river bottom and widen at the top to present a perpendicular face upstream, so that watertight sheet piling which is driven along the line of cribs will have a solid backing.

It is not certain what the dimensions of the new crib will be, as soundings are being taken to determine how far down it must reach to be effective.
