At the Theatre

Death Takes the Stage

A series of fiendish murders which polish off a film star, studio policeman and prominent director give the ingenious sleuths something to worry about in "Preview Murder Mystery," which will show at the Roosevelt theater in Bonneville Friday and Saturday, July 10 and 11.

The first victim, an actor who has just completed a picture, is found dead from poison in the studio room just after the film has been run for the first time. The other deaths follow shortly.

The action takes place on authentic studio sets, the background for the show almost rivaling in interest the intensely dramatic plot.

Many of the stars in the "Preview" cast have been appearing on the screen for years. Conway Tearle made his first show, "Dancing Mothers," in 1914. Reginald Denny, Rod LaRoque and Bryant Washburn have all been in films more than 15 years. Other members of the cast, including a few relative newcomers, are Frances Drake, Gail Patrick, George Barbier, Ian Keith and Jack Mulhall.

Thunder of big guns, sting of lashes on the backs of galley slaves, desert islands with sands as golden as the treasures they conceal, one man's fight for justice—those are some of the ingredients you find in "Captain Blood," sensational film to be shown at the Roosevelt theater Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, July 12 to 14.

Excellent in the title role is Errol Flynn, masculine, dominating, strong-willed hero. Branded as an outlaw because, as a doctor, he gave help to English rebels against the crown, he finds himself shipped to the West Indies as a slave, where he lives the life of a dog in spite of his learning and ability. He gains the favor of the gouty governor because of his knowledge of healing and eventually makes an escape.

Even as a slave he has fallen in love with the plantation boss's niece, who has saved him from being carried off to the mines, where his fate would have been worse even than on the plantation. Although he nurses a grudge against her because she "bought" him from her uncle, he later takes an opportunity to save her from a band of pirates, and eventually they are reconciled.

The whole play is powerfully conceived, compactly developed and splendidly photographed. Battle scenes at sea are pictured on a heroic scale, while a duel between Captain Blood and the pirate chief is one of the most breath taking ever filmed.

Really a tremendous picture—a strong story vigorously told with a love theme introduced on a plane high above the sentimental and mawkish—"Captain Blood" is one show you should not miss. It deserves a place beside "Mutiny on the Bounty", "Les Miserables" and the rest of the great pictures which prove that character of a man is stronger than steel and more potent than gunpowder.
