WILLIAMSES CHAT OVER SHORT-WAVE

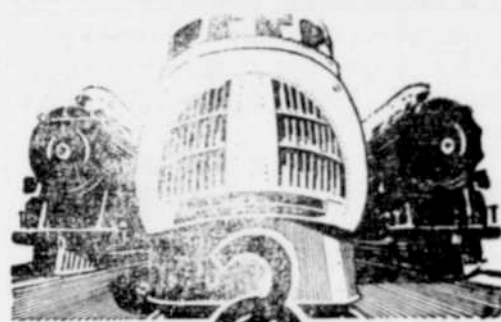
Ralph Williams of the West Coast Power Co. had an unexpected thrill Monday night—and so did Mrs. Williams, although she was far away, in Santa Cruz, California.

The Williamses talked together over short wave radio, Ralph from his own station here, his wife from a station owned by a friend in Santa Cruz.

Mr. Williams said he had not thought his wife would hear him, as his signals had failed to come in clearly at the California station during previous experiments, although he had understood his friend in the south perfectly. But Monday night the calls seemed to click, so the couple had a pleasant conversation, although both were too excited to say much.

Their daughter, Mary Ann, also was on the air briefly.

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Ralph tuned his receiver to 75 meters to catch the southern station, and the Santa Cruz operator tuned his to 160 meters, at which wave length Ralph's transmitter sends.

Mr. Williams is considering installing a more powerful station next winter, but has not yet decided whether or not he will do so.
