Burly George Bancroft, two fisted hero of "Underworld" and "Dragnet," returns to the screen in "Hell-Ship Morgan," billed at the Roosevelt theater in Bonneville Friday and Saturday, July 17 and 18.

But he proves again that beneath his rough exterior there beats a heart of gold. He's at his best in these roles where he travels around knocking people out and then setting them up in business because he's sorry for them.

Victor Jory, playing "Jim Allen," is the fellow who feels first Bancroft's fist and then his friendship. Bancroft, the rugged Morgan of the play, sends Jory sprawling because he refuses to have a drink. But Jory turns out to be weak from hunger, so Bancroft gives him a job aboard his ship, and the two become inseparable.

That's the set-up when beautiful Ann Sothorn comes breezing into their lives. She proceeds to marry one and fall in love with the other, which is the kind of situation movie directors get fat on.

In addition to the perplexing emotional tangles, the picture offers superb sea photography and the able direction of D. Ross Lederman.

### High-Powered Romance

Comedy joins romance and adventure in making "Desire," new film coming to the Roosevelt theater Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, July 19 to 21, a show worth seeing.

And Gary Cooper and Marlene Dietrich, co-starred for the first time since "Morocco," make most of the comedy as well as the romance and adventure.

The mood of this picture changes constantly. First we find Marlene suavely consummating the theft of a string of pearls from a Parisian jeweler, the next we find her beginning a hilarious romance with an American vacationist, who of course is Mr. Cooper.
