Incidentally, Arlen and Dumbrille, both first rank athletes in their college days, don't pull any punches when they put on their film fist-cuffs. A few scratches don't mean a thing to either of them.

Making her screen bow is Charlotte Wynters, late of the stage, who appears as Arlen's "heart trouble." She is the daughter of the town's leading citizen, who finds himself in a jack-pot, having promised his backing to Arlen but also having sunk a lot of money in the park. There's plenty of brainwork for all hands before the plot is straightened out, with the racketeers, as usual, getting the worst of it.

Barbaric Barbary

A bitter struggle between a handful of decent people and the vice impresarios of San Francisco's underworld of the Barbary Coast gives Edward G. Robinson, Miriam Hopkins and Joel McCrea an opportunity for some high-pressure emoting in Samuel Goldwyn's "Barbary Coast," scheduled Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, July 26, 27 and 28 at the Roosevelt theater.

Robinson plays the characteristic role of Louis Chamalis, vice lord, who falls in love with Miriam Hopkins and persuades her to preside over his gambling tables, which of course are as crooked as a bull terrier's tail. 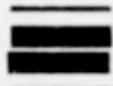

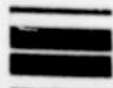
