SCORPION IS FOUND IN PILE OF SHAKES

Another scorpion put in an appearance in the dam area Monday when W. B. Peters, siding his house at Eagle Creek with shakes, uncovered one of the dread brutes hiding under a slab. He put it into a bottle and checked its appearance with the dictionary definition. It is a small creature, about two and a half inches long, with lobster-like claws, jointed body and long jointed tail, armed at the tip with a venomous sting.

Although the scorpion's stab is very painful, it is rarely fatal to humans. This specimen of Peters is a beautiful one, larger than most seen in this region, although in certain desert countries they grow to a length of eight inches.

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
