BETTER BEACH FOR BATHING REQUESTED

If the citizens of the dam area wish to take advantage of the Red Cross swimming instruction for the children of the area they will have to find a more suitable beach than the one last year, is the word received at the Chronicle office this week from Prince Koberg, head instructor of the Hood River county swim campaign.

"As soon as a beach is located we will start the program rolling," Koberg stated. He has two general schedules in mind. The first is to run it the same as last year with instruction once a week. The second method is to wait until the campaign is complete at Hood River which will be on the 23 of August and then give an intensive six-day campaign with two instructors.

Koberg was very optimistic over the possibilities of working Bonneville children into the instruction this year and will be down the early part of the week to make the necessary arrangements.

More than 85 children took advantage of this free instruction last year.

TEMPORARY PASSAGE BUILT FOR SALMON

About 60 cubic yards of concrete will have to be moved to complete the temporary fishway. The junior cofferdam, which is keeping this section dry, also will have to be knocked away to permit passage of the fish.

Blasting of necessity is light, in order not to disturb other structural features of the dam.

These passageways for salmon have been put in largely to answer demands of fishermen on the lower Columbia who complained to the state fish commission that the salmon and blueback were not getting through between the piers. Legal action had been threatened by representatives of the fishermen.

Officials of the P. J. McGowan packing company at Warrendale earlier this week pointed out that seiners above the dam were taking out only 800 to 1300 pounds of fish daily, whereas last season their take averaged seven or eight tons daily. The packing company officials were pessimistic about the future of commercial fishing on the river.

A letter from Eric Enquist, Springfield resident well known in the dam area, to the Oregonian earlier in the week, stated that the action of the fish commission "is the beginning of an attempt to charge Bonneville dam with destruction of the salmon industry on the Columbia river, while any impartial observer familiar with fishing methods on the river knows that the combination nets and trammel net used by gill-netters have already so depleted the stock of large chinook salmon that few if any reach the spawning grounds."

Enquist agreed with Colonel Thomas M. Robins, division engineer in charge of dam construction, who said no barrier of swift water is holding back migrant salmon and sturgeon below Bonneville dam.

PIONEERS RESPOND TO REUNION CALL
