FLOW LINE COMES FIRST, SAYS WYERS

Harry Kuckenberg, water system contractor, was asked by the council to give an estimate on a two-cell jail, to have six-inch concrete walls and floor and metal roof. Councilman Clark said he would provide a plot of ground for the jail in return for taxes. Wood for forms, sand, gravel and labor are available for jail construction without charge.

Councilman Millsap spoke in favor of a concrete slab to roof the water system reservoir, instead of the metal gable roof now planned. The concrete roof would keep the water much cooler and would eliminate danger from falling trees. Cost of the concrete roof, which would require an additional \$1000, is the chief bar to its construction. The council declined to consider the question, preferring to concentrate on obtaining funds for the flow line.

Purchase of fire hose for the city, in order to take advantage of possible reductions in insurance rates, was discussed and City Recorder Carlson instructed to obtain requirements as to hose from underwriters in Portland. Samples were displayed by Councilman Clark.

Councilman Clark also proposed a license of \$25 a year on wood dealers, and a license on electricians and plumbers modeled after that of Hood River. City Attorney Wyers was instructed to draw up an ordinance embracing this proposal.
