CONTRACT SHIFTS ARE NEGOTIATED

Readjustment of prices on bids submitted by the Columbia Construction company for work on the spillway dam and fishways was under way this week, according to the Pittock block office.

Original bids were made on the basis of broad specifications, and adjustments now are being negotiated have been contemplated all along, officials said. The Columbia company has computed the amount by which their bid prices will have to be increased, and the figure has been submitted to the division engineer's office. In some cases unit costs will be as much as doubled, but these represent isolated instances.

The engineers will study the company's request and make a counter offer, after which heads of the two groups can get together and arrive at satisfactory settlement. It is understood there is enough of a cushion in the amount appropriated for the dam to take care of these anticipated increases.
