Water for City Plentiful, Says Millsap

Citizens of Cascade Locks who have expressed doubts as to sufficiency of the water supply in the creek were answered last week by Councilman Millsap, who described relative conditions of flow and consumption.

Water is now passing over the creek falls at the rate of one cubic foot per second, Millsap said, or about 250,000 gallons per day. Per capita consumption of water in Portland, including street sprinkling, lawn spraying and industrial use, is 100 gallons per day on the average. With about half the water flowing over the falls available to the city, or 130,000 gallons per day there would be a comfortable margin even at the Portland rate of consumption, as the population of Cascade Locks is roughly 1000.

Millsap said the government records at the locks showed no year when the water supply failed, or some have reminisced. Neither was there any year when the hydraulic gates of the locks were operated by falls, according to the record.

At present there is a six-inch government pipe from the falls to the government intake, which is a short distance above the city intake. The city plans to put in an eight-inch flow line over the same route in order to utilize all the water at the falls, some of which is now running to waste underground.

An eight-inch pipe runs from the city intake to the 225,000-gallon reservoir, where it may be diverted into the reservoir or by-passed directly to the city mains. An eight-inch overflow pipe leads from the reservoir toward Mr. Haskin's property.

Henry Kuckenberg, contractor, has expressed himself as entirely satisfied that there will be plenty of water for the city. The reservoir itself contains enough to supply the city for more than two days, and will receive a steady 24-hour flow whereas it will be drawn upon heavily only over an eight- or ten-hour period.
