

Heavy Lumber Production Increase Shown

A 1935 lumber production increase for Oregon and Washington of 21 per cent above 1934 is indicated in preliminary data collected by the Pacific northwest forest experiment station in cooperation with the U. S. bureau of the census. The forest service announces this week. The cut of lumber for 1935 in the two states is shown to be 6,592,237,000 board feet as against 5,443,912,000 board feet cut in 1934. In 1932 the cut reached a depression low of 3,864,581,000 feet, it is pointed out.

Of lumber cut in 1935, Washington produced 3,459,951,000 board feet and Oregon 3,139,286,000, according to the experiment station report. Douglas fir led among species cut with a total of 4,570,821,000 board feet, of which Washington produced 2,717,390,000 feet and Oregon 1,853,431,000 feet. Ponderosa pine took second rank among species produced, with Oregon cutting 1,024,017,000 feet and Washington 281,452,000.

Other species cut included western hemlock with a total of 249,115,000 feet, of which Washington accounted for 184,911,000; spruce, of which Washington cut 55,464,000 feet and Oregon 72,504,000; and cedar, of which Washington cut 89,737,000 feet and Oregon 19,941,000 feet.

Idaho white pine with a total cut of 81,285,000 feet. Port Orford cedar with 32,510,000 feet, sugar pine with 31,599,000 feet, white fir with 24,290,000 feet, larch with 17,842,000, and hardwoods with 48,660,000 feet, are also among produced species listed.

Shingle production in 1935 amounted to 3,554,966 squares for Washington and 452,457 for Oregon. Lath production totaled 159,524,000 pieces for Washington and 116,786,000 pieces for Oregon.

The canvass showed that 1,122 lumber and shingle mills in the two states operated at least a portion of the year.

Washington stands first and Oregon second among lumber producing states, the forest service points out.

Tightening of Fire Laws In Prospect

A rigid enforcement of the state law which prohibits the throwing away of lighted material along the highways of the state was announced recently by State Forester J. W. Ferguson. Not only have orders been issued from the forestry department to all wardens for a strict enforcement of the law, together with the inauguration of special road patrols in certain hazardous areas of the state, but Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, has heartily endorsed the move and pledged his support and cooperation through the issuance of orders to his personnel to make a special effort to stop this practice.

"We are now entering the most critical period of the fire season," stated Mr. Ferguson, "for records of past years show that the most disastrous fires occur after the first of August. This year there is a definite increase in the hazard over past years because of a favorable spring with frequent rains which has resulted in an unusually dense growth of grass and weeds. With the coming of the hot, dry weather and the drying out of this growth, it has resulted in one of the most hazardous fire situations that has faced the department in a number of years. Smokers are responsible for nearly a third of all man-caused fires which have occurred on lands coming under the jurisdiction of this department, and the fact that the major portion of them originate along the highways of the state indicates that it is the traveling motorist who is to blame.

"This law which prohibits the throwing away of lighted material has been in effect for the past eleven years and an intensive educational campaign has been carried on to inform the public of the fact and to secure its cooperation. Nevertheless, the number of these fires is far too great and a determined effort will be made to reduce them through law enforcement."

PHONEY INSURANCE COMPANIES SCORED

Hugh H. Earle, state insurance commissioner, has asked newspapers of the state to warn the public against serving as agents for or purchasing insurance from unauthorized companies and associations. In acting as an agent for such concerns a person subjects himself to heavy penalties and in buying from them he is due for disappointment when he presents his claim, as these associations seldom pay back what they

promised and it is impossible for citizens to get legal action against them in this state.

Frank Tyrer, representing the Fidelity Mutual association and the Consolidated Insurance Underwriters, two unlicensed insurance companies, both of Minneapolis, Minn., was tried in Clatsop county and fined \$50 and costs, and sentenced to 30 days in jail. Other persons who accept similar positions make themselves liable to similar penalties.
