SAWDUST PILE BURNS FOUR HOURS MONDAY

The sawdust pile on the old mill site near the Cascade Locks railroad depot blazed again Monday afternoon, and for four hours two fire lines were steadily at work. Marshal Colin Merrill and Fire Chief G. N. Heggard directed operations.

Schnitzer & Wolf of Portland, owners of the property on which the sawdust pile stands, apparently have taken no measures to destroy or control the hazard, having written the city for suggested means. The council, through Attorney Tennis Wyers, told them the question was strictly up to them, as the city has two ordinances governing fire hazards and nuisances which apply to the sawdust pile.

Springs, Georgia; and development of a 10-acre Boy Scout camp near the springs.

Ernest Frutiger, William Keeler and Ira Owen, president of the chamber, were named by Owen on a committee to obtain permission from dam officials for Frutiger to drive his Bonneville bus as far as the Columbia Construction company's office on Bradford's island, so that north-bank workmen would not have so far to walk after leaving the bus. Because a previous bus operator abused privileges extended him, the present bus line now must end its run at guard post No. 3, south of the power house.

Mr. Laber reminded chamber mem-

bers of an open letter by W. D. B. Dodson of the Portland chamber, published in the Oregonian, urging everyone in this area to fight for what they want. Laber suggested a four-lane highway for the Oregon bank of the Columbia, and said the Mid-Columbia chamber should appoint a committee to meet with Dodson to discuss the Bonneville rate structure.

M. L. Morgan, scoutmaster of Cascade Locks troop 390, reported that the troop is planning to build a cabin on a tract near Dry creek, and asked the chamber to supply funds for necessary materials, principally hardware, as rustic lumber is available on the ground. Morgan declared the troop is the liveliest in the Portland area, which includes Stevenson, and the state. He, with John H. Travis and W. J. Carlson, were

named on a committee to determine what would be needed and report to the chamber any proposed action.

Miss Thelma Dougherty, who was "Miss Cascade Locks" in a competition recently sponsored by the chamber, was made an honorary member.

C. L. Rankin, commissioned justice of the peace for Cascade Locks by Governor Martin, told chamber members of the fight he was making to have a district set aside for him by the county court, resulting in the appointment of Oscar Hyde, M. L. Morgan and Ernest Frutiger on a committee to investigate possibilities of chamber aid.

W. J. Carlson spoke briefly on plans of the school board to carry on 4-H club work intensively in the schools this year.

Guests who were introduced included Mayor Hufford, his son Sam-

uel who has set up an undertaking parlor in Stevenson, Miss Dougherty, Dr. Harris of Stevenson and G. Gillispie, formerly of Portland, who opened a photographic studio last week. Mr. Gillispie closed his meeting by taking a "good-will" picture of the chamber group, lined behind the table at Merrill's waist to be "shot."
