At The Roosevelt

Second of the "Hopalong Cassidy" films to be seen here within the past few weeks is "The Eagle's Brood," showing at the Roosevelt theater Friday and Saturday, October 2 and 3.

William Boyd is the fearless, hard-riding son-of-a-gun who again plays the Hopalong role, giving an expert characterization of the cowboy-hero created by Clarence Mulford.

While riding the range one day, Boyd is caught in quicksand and is rescued by William Farnum, famous ex-bandit who is forbidden to cross the border. In return for saving his

life, Boyd promises to help him find his grandson.

Plenty of action follows when the sweetheart of Addison Richards, Hell Center's ace outlaw, finds the boy and hides him, but is murdered before she can reveal his hiding place to Boyd.

Gun-play and thundering hooves punctuate the action at frequent intervals. Howard Bretherton, who directed the first Hopalong film, did the same excellent work in this picture.

Featured besides Boyd and Farnum are Jimmy Ellison, the "Johnny Nelson" who became famous as Hopalong's pal, Joan Woodbury, the bandit's sweetheart, George Hayes, Dorothy Revier and George Mari.

Feudin' in Color

Bitterness of generations-old feuds and sweetness of mountain romance are caught by the color camera in John Fox Jr.'s epic of the Cumberland hills, "The Trail of the Lonesome Pine," billed at the Roosevelt theater Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, October 4, 5 and 6.

This picture has everything—magnificent photography, recording every hue and shade of inspiring landscapes; a powerful story, supercharged with emotion, written by America's best-known chronicler of the loves and hates of the mountain folk; a great cast, topped by Sylvia Sidney, Henry Fonda and Fred MacMurray; the tune the whole nation sang—"Melody From the Skies," the type of song that makes popular music bearable; and Walter Wagner's producing genius, which has distinguished a number of the best of recent pictures.

The story takes us back to the wooded Cumberland mountains, to the section where deadly feuds are raging among the illiterate mountain families, chief among whom are the Tollivers and the Falins, whose main delight is to lie in ambush and kill each other off. Fred MacMurray is a city engineer who becomes embroiled with both sides when he attempts to get their consent to run a railroad right-of-way to valuable coal property.

Running through the "Trail of the Lonesome Pine" is the tender romance between MacMurray and Miss Sidney, primitive passionate daughter of the hills, with a subtle undercurrent of the anguish brought to the simple mountaineers by their inability to understand modern civilization.

Stranded on the Strand

The blond bombshell finds herself friendless, jobless and penniless in London at the beginning of the war in "Suzy," spy-aviation story scheduled at the Roosevelt theater on Wednesday and Thursday, October 7 and 8.

The blond bombshell is, of course, Jean Harlow, who has made herself a reputation for playing the part of well-built and not-too-conscientious women. She is the victim of circumstances in this show, however, as she marries a second time in the belief that her first husband is dead. Imagine her embarrassment when he shows up in Paris, very much alive!

The poor fellow is implicated in a spy plot, and when she goes to warn him, spies kill the second husband for fear he will upset their plans. Suzy and hubby No. 1 fix everything up by crashing a plane, putting No. 2's body in it, and burning it, freeing him from the dishonorable life he had been leading.

Able supporting Miss Harlow are Franchot Tone, Cary Grant, Lewis Stone, Benita Hume and a score of other stars.
