Statement of G. A. COBB

Independent Candidate for District Attorney of Hood River County, Oregon



TO ALL THE VOTERS OF HOOD RIVER COUNTY, OREGON:

I am an Independent candidate for the office of District Attorney of this county. I am a Democrat and a New Deal Democrat. I have been a Democrat all my life. I have lived in this state since 1888. Missourian by birth. I am 63 years of age. Have practiced Law in this state most of the time since June, 1912.

In 1914 I was a Candidate for the Democratic nomination of Governor of the State of Oregon, being defeated in the primaries by Dr. C. J. Smith.

I have practiced law in Cascade Locks, Oregon, for the past twenty years. I feel that an explanatory statement from me is due the Democrats of this county, explaining the reason why I am running as a Candidate for District Attorney, as an Independent, instead of under my party label. I was urged by my many friends to run in the primary election last May for the Democratic nomination. I did not wish to stand in the way of any other good Democratic lawyers of longer residence in the county than I, who might wish to run for the nomination. No Democrat offered himself at the primary and my Democrat friends, as well as Republican friends, have insisted that I file as an Independent Candidate against the present Republican incumbent. I owe no favors to any special group, and, if elected, promise equal consideration to all.
