At The Roosevelt

Six shooter battles machine gun in an epic duel between the old West and modern gangster tactics in "The Last Outlaw," billed at the Roosevelt theater in Bonneville Friday and Saturday, October 16 and 17.

Co-starred are Hoot Gibson and Harry Carey, both familiar to fans who like plenty of dust and powder-smoke along with their film fare.

Carey takes the part of an old bad man who was jailed for "standing up" the false front of an old cow town. Twenty-five years after he was locked up he regains his freedom, and again goes on a shooting spree, matching himself and his six-guns against his modern counterpart, armed with sawed-off shotguns and "choppers."

Henry B. Walthall also emphasizes the change from old to new customs

as the old-time sheriff who joins Carey when a bungling politician is unable to cope with a mob which has kidnaped Carey's daughter.

Gibson and Margaret Callahan provide youthful romance as lovers separated by the brutal gang big shot, portrayed by Tom Tyler, and his "rod" men, Ray Mayer and Harry Jans. Christy Cabanne directed and Robert Risk produced the picture.

"Tiger Man" Ruggles

They've got a new role for Charlie Ruggles. No longer is he the blundering, hen-pecked little fellow you are accustomed to, but a wild, ferocious killer. Only in his sleep, however.

Yep, Charlie is labeled a somnambulant "tiger man" in his latest uproarious farce, "Early to Bed," coming to the Roosevelt theater Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, October 18, 19 and 20.

Charlie has been engaged to Mary Boland for 26 years, and at last they work up enough currency and courage to get married and honeymoon at Niagara falls. But Charlie, a clerk in a glass-eye firm, sees a chance to land the world's biggest mock-optic order in a nearby sanatorium, so the honeymoon goes flitting out the window.

The sanatorium, known as Lake Oskawabongee lodge, is the scene of a murder and jewel robbery, of which Charlie is suspected because of his known propensity for sleep-walking. The solution of the murder, with high-pressure selling of glass eyes thrown in at every turn, makes this film one of the Boland-Ruggles team's best.

George Barbier, Gail Patrick, Robert McWade, Lucien Littlefield and Colin Tapley are featured in the supporting cast. The picture was directed by Norman McLeod from a script of which Littlefield was co-author.

Strange Romance

A new slant on G-man activities is offered by "Public Enemy's Wife," feature attraction at the Roosevelt theater Wednesday and Thursday, October 21 and 22, a Warner Brothers' production in which Pat O'Brien, Margaret Lindsay, Robert Armstrong, Cesar Romero and Dick Foran have the leading roles.

The picture is littered with thrills, with scenes showing railroad guards being overpowered as a gangster killer escapes; the attempted murder of the husband of the killer's divorcee; the bride's kidnapping; a bang-studded battle between G-men and the criminal herd in their hide-out; seizing of a ship chartered by gangsters who are quitting the country, taking the bride and captured secret service men with them.

Miss Lindsay plays the part of a beautiful and cultured woman who falls for the blarney of a patent-leather gangster and marries him. He is snagged by the law, and lets her take the rap along with him although she is innocent.

Trouble starts brewing when Miss Lindsay, who has served out her term, tells her husband she plans to divorce him and start life anew. He swears he will break out of prison and kill her husband should she fall in love and marry again.

She does so, and he lives up to his threat, breaking away from train guards after having been let out of prison on offering to turn state's witness. Pat O'Brien, G-man, induces Miss Lindsay to go through the form of marrying him in order to lay a trap for Romero, her ex-husband.

From that point on the picture rises to a smashing climax in which Romero is shot down aboard his privately chartered yacht.
