PORTLANDER KILLED NEAR EAGLE CREEK

John Starnes, 27, of Portland, was killed by a falling rock which crashed through the window of the car in which he and Robert Ellington of Portland were riding early Sunday morning after the machine had collided with another car and rolled down a 50-foot bank on the Columbia River highway, just inside the Multnomah county line.

In the other car were Ernest Baurer of Sherwood and Chris Sturm of Tigard.

Ellington was held in Multnomah county jail on an involuntary manslaughter charge. He said he and Starnes were returning from a dance at Cascade Locks at the time of the accident.
