**POST OFFICE AIDS SECURITY PROGRAM**

Administration of the federal government's social security program, registration for which will be begun November 16, will be handled by representatives of the social security board in Washington, D. C., with the assistance of the postoffice department, it was announced last week.

The postoffice will distribute to employers blanks entitled "Employer's application for identification number, Form SS-4," and later will distribute the employees' blanks labeled "Application for social security account number." November 24 is the date set when workers will commence to receive their application blanks.

The social security board urges employers and employees to refrain

from making inquiries at the board or postoffices until after receipt of official forms and instructions. Af-

ter that representatives of the bodies will be glad to give the assistance necessary.

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
