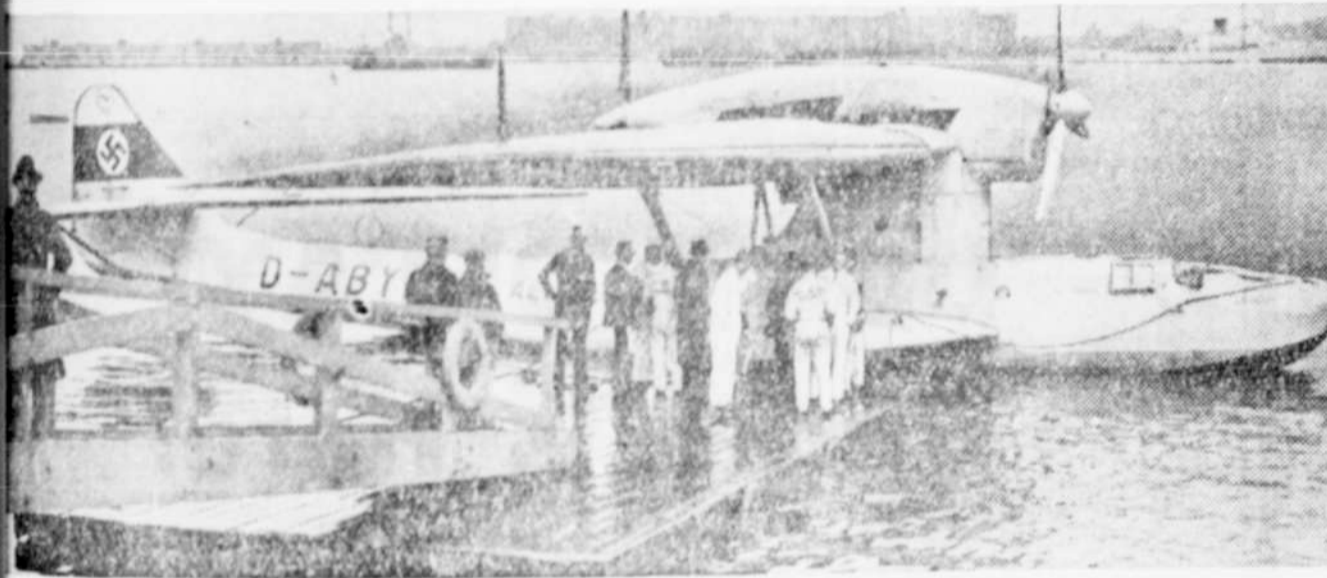

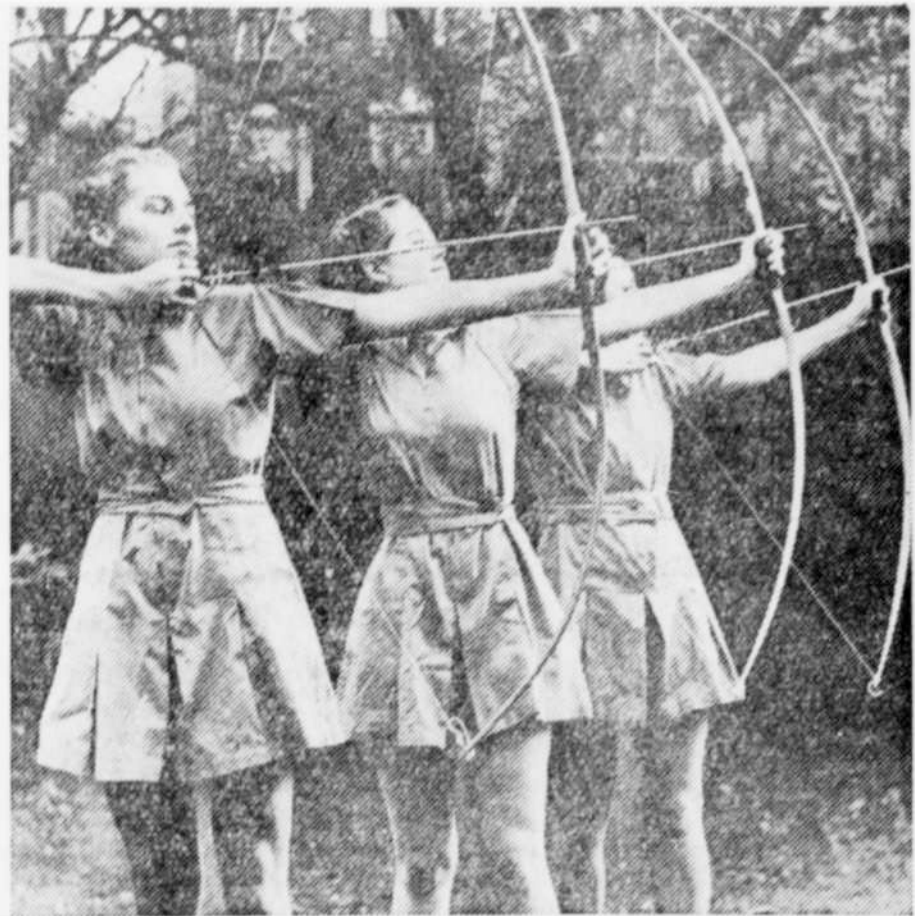
It's Grape Juice Time in Sunny Old California

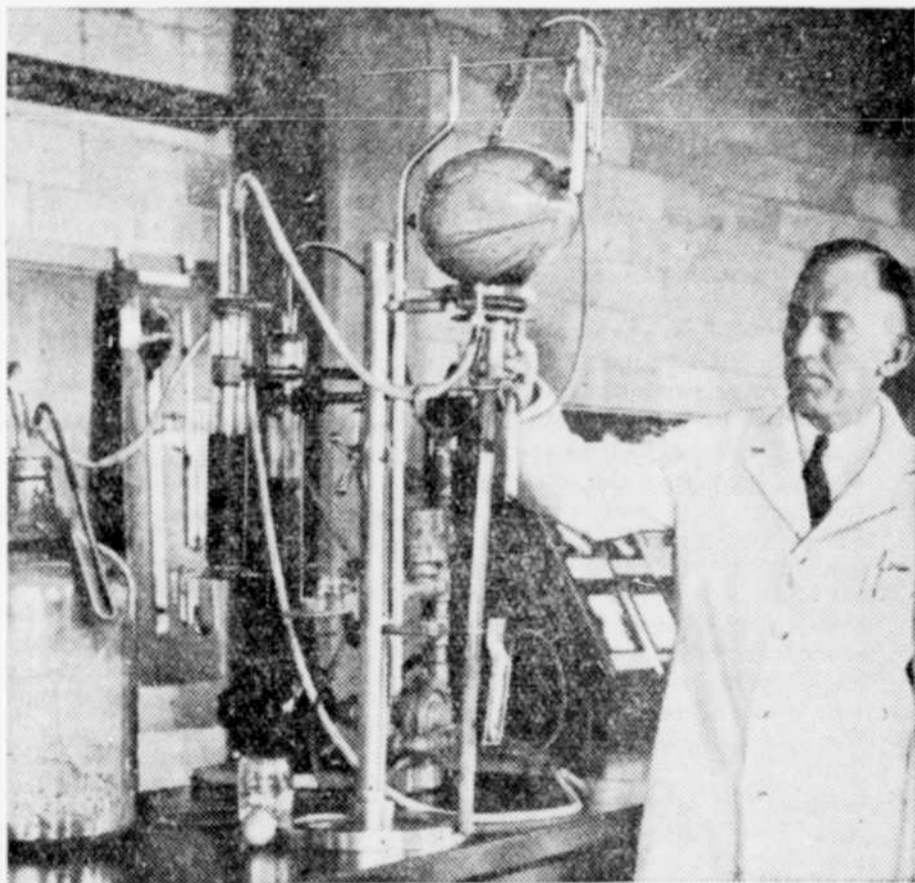
Superstitious Scotland
