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BIG TIMES AHEAD

A dream of empire that has every chance of becoming reality was given expression at the hearings on a dam at The Dalles held Tuesday this week by United States engineers.

More than idle chatter were claims by spokesmen that at last the Inland Empire was to become an empire in fact as well as in name. With the opening of the Columbia as a cheap waterway, easy of access and safe to travel; with the completion of Bonneville and Coulee dams and their open invitation to heavy industry of many varieties; with the irrigation of millions of acres by the Coulee, Vale-Owyhee and Roza projects; with the speeding of highway traffic through construction of a water-grade Columbia River highway—how can the program miss fire?

Significant was the fact that the down-river fish industries, instead of coming out flatfooted against the dam, asked the engineers "to proceed with caution and protect the fishermen's interests." There is little question but what the development of the Columbia as a water highway will be carried forward as rapidly as necessity and funds permit.

This is no time for soreheads to bellyache because a few pet acres will be drowned out, or because one town gets somewhat the advantage of another.

Teamwork was strongly in evidence at The Dalles meeting. Teamwork is demanded of every public body and every individual within a half-day's drive of the Columbia. The Chronicle repeats its time-brightened trumpet cry: Big times are ahead for the gorge!

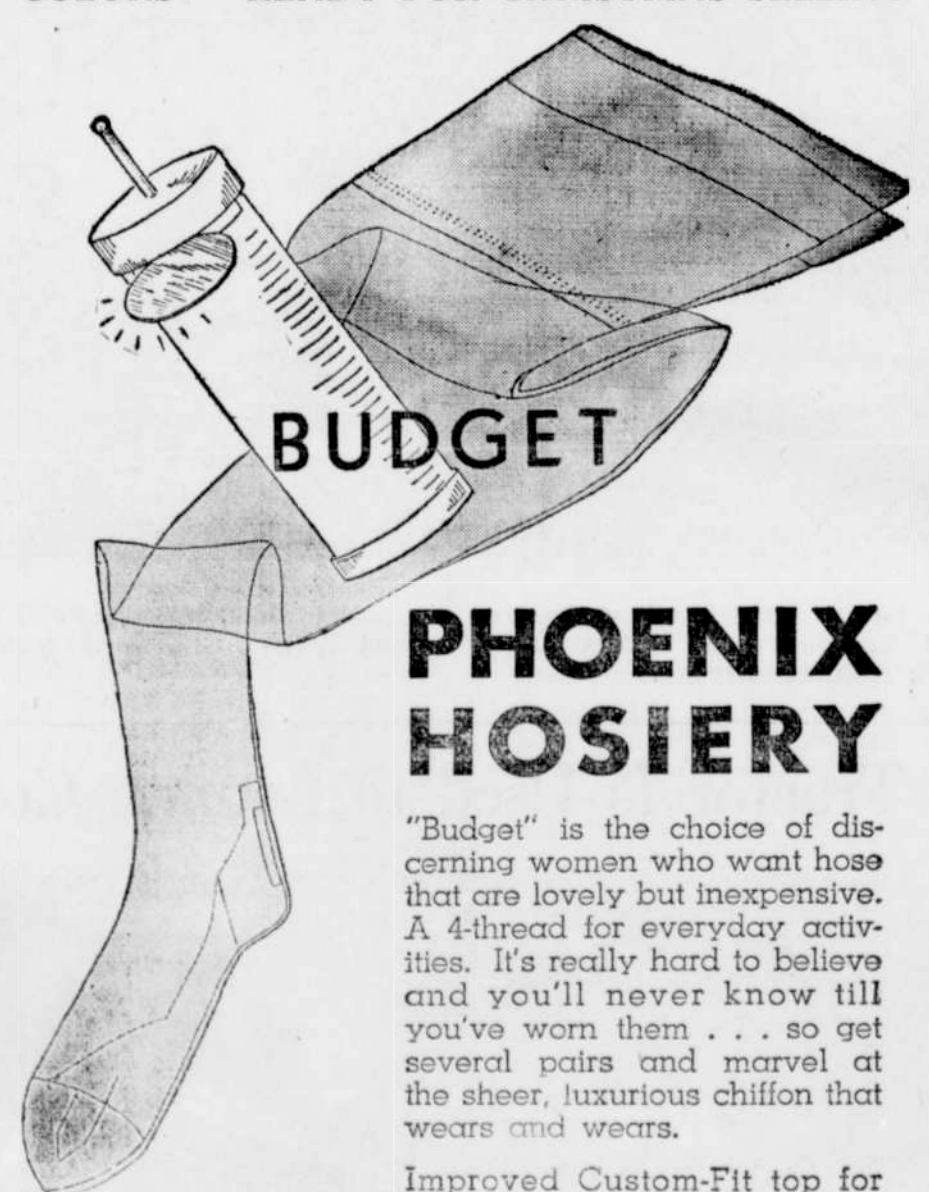
