6277 CUBIC YARDS POURED DURING WEEK

Here's the summary of operations in the north cofferdam area, at the end of the current week:

Concrete poured: 6277 cubic yards, almost entirely on the north side.

Pier 1, plus 36 feet; piers 2 to 6, and pier 8, plus 56 feet; pier 7, plus 36 feet.

Downstream fishlocks: Plus 50 feet at highest point; center section poured as high as floor slab Sunday.

Bridge Work Continues

The Gilpin Construction company this week was hard at work on a platform built on piling around pier 8 beneath the Hood River-White Salmon bridge. The platform will serve as a base of operations for enlarging the diameter of the pier four feet, so that it will be capable of supporting the tower hoist and lift span which will have to be put in before navigation can begin on Cascade lake.

Concrete in the enlargement section will be poured under water by the process known as trimming, previously described in the Sun. Steel sheet piling will take the place of forms under water.

Pier 13, all new construction under the north wooden approach to the bridge, has been poured past an elevation of 60 feet above sea level.

The lift span and pier enlargement are being financed by the United States corps of engineers as part of their program for developing the Columbia river channel, while the other work is being done by the bridge company. The engineers will also have to pay for having both north and south approaches to the bridge raised, as they will be too near the level of the lake when the dam is completed, and subject to flooding.

POURING CONTINUES ON TUNNEL PROJECT

Two concrete tunnel sections in the east shaft of the Tooth Rock Columbia River highway tunnel have been poured to date, but so far no pouring has been done on the portal. Portable forms are being used, consisting of a steel framework overlain with planking, which is faced with galvanized sheet steel. Two sets of forms will be sufficient to do the entire pouring job on the tunnel.

Workmen are also putting in the ring stones on the west portal. Ring stones are the long, narrow stones placed radially to rim the portal concrete.
