At The Roosevelt

Friday-Saturday

A lively story of how one girl got her man in spite of the greatest of obstacles is told in "Along Came Love," a gay comedy co-featuring Irene Hervey and Charles Starrett, which plays at the Roosevelt theater Friday and Saturday.

Miss Hervey plays the part of a highly romantic shoppirl who is in love with the ancient Greek god Orion and decides to find a man in present-day New York who has all the attributes of the mighty hunter. She finds him in Starrett, who is employed as a doorman at a large moving picture theatre. The young man, however, is a medical student, and has other things on his mind besides romance. This, however, does not deter Miss Hervey, who sets out to get him in real earnest, using some tricks and devices suggested by the hard-boiled wise-cracking counter companion of Miss Hervey, which are, at the very least, novel.

Starrett falls, and young love blooms—until further complications arise to blight their romance. But these, too, are finally ironed out in a romantic climax that is not without comic aspects.

"Along Came Love" was written by Austin Strong, author of "Seventh Heaven," the holder of the all-time motion picture attendance record. It was directed by Bert Lytell, former silent screen star.

Sunday-Monday-Tuesday

"The Texas Rangers," King Vidor's historical epic of the men who molded a state from the territory of Texas, comes Sunday, Monday and Tuesday to the Roosevelt theatre.

The picture features an all star cast headed by Fred MacMurray and Jack Oakie, and including among its head liners Jean Parker, Lloyd Nolan, Edward Ellis, Bennie Bartlett and a score of others.

Filed on location in Texas and New Mexico by a company of several thousand persons, with the assistance of officials of both states, "The Texas Rangers" combines a fast-moving, action and thrill-filled story and a panoramic view of the unfolding of the history of the Lone Star State.

Banded together under an oath to "drive out hostile Indians, stop feuds, destroy cattle and horse thieves, gangs of stage and train robbers, kill or capture murderers, and make Texas a reasonably safe place in which to live," the Rangers contributed much to the color of the state's early days. Both MacMurray and Oakie join the fearless band in the course of the motion picture.

Encounters of Ranger companies with bands of marauding Indians and with stage coach robbers are a part of the plot development. Miss Parker, remembered for her sincere interpretations of important roles in "Sequoia" and "Little Women," is cast as the daughter of the head of a Ranger unit.
