

New County Officers Take Over Duties

Hood River county said hello and goodbye to two sets of county officers this week, although about half the "new men" were holdovers re-elected in November.

R. W. Perry of Pine Grove will be the new member of the county court, replacing Forrest Moe. Perry says he plans to continue the court's program of economy, putting the county on a pay-as-you-go basis. He is also interested in maintaining all county roads in the best possible condition.

In the sheriff's office John Sheldrake will step from his position of chief deputy into the shoes of his former superior, William Edick.

Sheldrake reports great activity in the sheriff's office where about \$80,000 in taxes has been received within the past month. Receipt of money for auto licenses has also increased the work handled by the office. Sheldrake's new chief deputy will be W. M. Sylvester, for some years a property owner of the county.

W. L. Vannet, formerly assistant clerk, will take over the clerkship vacated by Harold Blackman. His assistant will be Mrs. Effie Turner, until recently employed in the county agent's office.

Other county officers are John Baker, district attorney, re-elected over George A. Cobb; C. C. Anderson, coroner; C. M. Hurlburt, engineer, and Mrs. Jessie Bishop, treasurer, all unopposed.

MARKHAM ASKS MORE MONEY

From the unexpended regular funds \$2,700,000 is being applied to powerhouse facilities, including substructure and superstructure, integral fishways, two 60,000 horsepower turbines, two 43,000 kilowatt generators and other equipment.

The report showed the fishways construction contract called for \$1,271,000, and continuance of work on the dam and reservoir \$2,894,000, with the remainder going to navigation facilities, channel improvement and railroad relocation.

From the unexpended emergency fund balance \$7,510,374 was applied to new work on dam and reservoir and spillway dam, and on the integral fishway structure, with the remainder going to accounts payable.

The amount requested for the 1937-38 fiscal year would be applied as follows:

Navigation facilities, including lock-control equipment and other miscellaneous work, \$347,000.

Powerhouse facilities, mostly for inside equipment, installed, \$450,000.

Purchase of mechanical and electrical equipment, screens, gates, and masonry for fishway, and installation, \$1,130,000.

Railroad revisions and protection, by settlement, \$2,906,000.

Permanent buildings and grounds, \$266,000.

Highway revision and protection, by settlement, \$310,000.

Protective works at The Dalles and other locations, \$585,000.

Reservoir lands and damages, land and flowage purchases, \$689,000.

Improvement of Three-Mile rapids, \$100,000.

Removal of Cascade Locks gates, \$20,000.

Installation of drift handling, gate maintenance, gallery unwatering pump and elevator equipment, \$55,000.

Dam and reservoir — approach roads, viaduct, drift-handling equipment, gate-maintenance equipment, \$116,000.

MARK APPROACHES RECORD

Second largest annual tree planting program in the history of the national forests of Oregon and Washington is being completed this month according to records of the United States forest service just made public. In spite of delay caused by the unprecedented dry spell and the fact that so many men were engaged on fire duty, a total of 1,480,000 young trees are being planted on 2,000 acres this season. Combined with last spring's plantings, this brings the year's total to 3,038,000 trees covering 4,418 acres, or approximately seven square miles of forest area. The total closely approaches the record set in 1934 when 3,295,000 trees were planted.

All plantations this season consist of two-year-old Douglas firs which are being used to reclaim burned over or logged off areas. In the Willamette national forest near Oak-

ridge 326 acres are being planted to 250,000 young trees. On the Siuslaw national forest near Mt. Hebo 200,000 trees are being used.
