3186 Men Placed

A total of 3186 men have been placed by the Oregon state employment service during 1936, according to Mrs. Jimmie May Catherwood, director. Of these 588 were taken for employment by the PWA on Bonneville and Grand Coulee dams; 174 on new PWA work, 74 by the state highway department, 110 in other public placements, and 2240 in private industry.

MRS. HICKEY TELLS AUXILIARY'S AIM

Three important legislative measures will be urged by the American Legion Auxiliary when Congress convenes next month, Mrs. Cecil Hickey, legislative chairman of the local unit of the Auxiliary, has announced.

The Auxiliary will join the American Legion in asking federal protection for widows and orphans of World War veterans, the passage of a universal service law, and maintenance of adequate national defense. Efforts will be made to develop wide public understanding of and interest in these measures.

Widows and dependent children of deceased veterans of all other wars are now given government protection, explained Mrs. Hickey. The Legion and Auxiliary are asking that similar benefits be extended to those of deceased World War veterans. At present only dependents of deceased World War veterans 30 per cent or more disabled in war service are eligible to government aid.

TOURISTS INCREASE

Secretary of State Earl Snell announced today that the increase in tourist registrations in 1936 exceeded the previous year by 40 per cent. This is an even greater pick-up in registrations than anticipated earlier in the year.

More than 140,000 motor vehicles from other states entered Oregon during 1936, which was a substantial gain over the registration of 100,300 cars in the preceding year. Final 1936 tabulations are still being received from registrars throughout the state, but an increase of at least 40,000 nonresident cars is indicated in present reports.

The month of December alone brought an increase of approximately 1800 registrations, with the total reaching 5200.

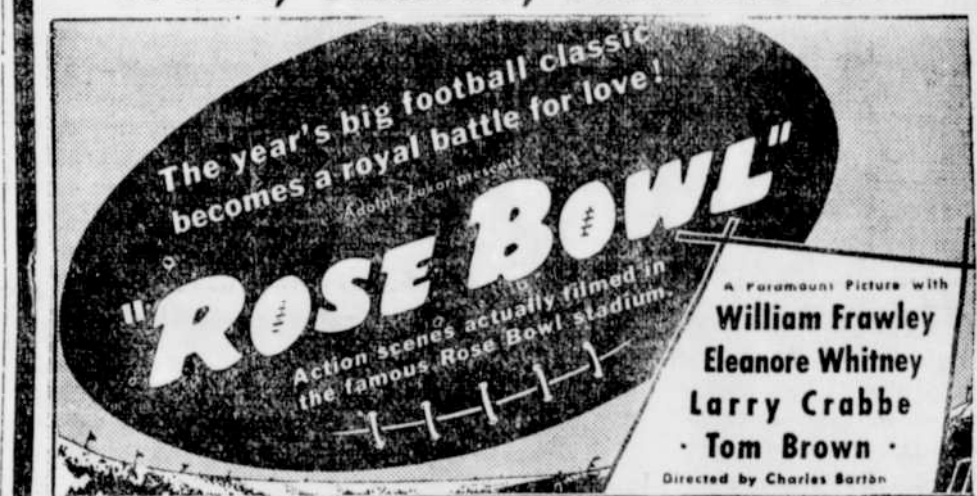
