Sheldon Sackett of the Coos Bay Times and Salem Statesman has purchased the Eugene News.

The Portland Rose Festival association's float won special awards at the Pasadena Tournament of Roses and was placed third in the international class behind Australia and University of Washington entries.

Wheat prices have moved up 17 cents in the past two months with the recent \$1.37 per bushel level the highest mark in many months. Current reports indicate the heaviest northwest plantings in many years.

Federal bureau reports are that feed prices are headed for 1934 levels and that herd reductions are indicated. Simultaneously there is agitation to increase hog production in Oregon and Washington so that present importations may be eliminated.

BONNEVILLE USES FOR INDUSTRY TOLD

Pulp and paper: woodpulp, limestone, sulphur, caustic, chlorine, salt cake; chlorine and caustic: salt brine; rayon: bleached sulphite pulp; ferrochrome: chrome ore, scrap iron,

coal; ferrosilicon: silica rock, iron, coal; ferromanganese: manganese ore, coal or charcoal; pig iron and steel: iron ore and coal or charcoal, scrap iron; calcium carbide: limestone and coal; electrothermal phosphorus: phosphate rock, silica and coal; electrolytic zinc: zinc ore; aluminum: bauxite, coal; magnesium: magnesite.

This list is not meant to be complete but indicates some of the most likely prospects for industries provided all factors of plant sites, water supply, power, labor, and raw materials are favorable.

Pulp and Paper. The present trend in pulp and paper in the Northwest is toward production of the better grades and away from newsprint. Bleached sulphite pulp capacity is increasing and demands for rayon pulp are more and more being met from Northwest bleached hemlock pulp mills. The areas which are most likely to experience an increase in pulp mill capacity are those located near the available timber along the Columbia river to its mouth and up and down the coast of Washington and Oregon, Longview, Astoria, Willapa Bay, Grays Harbor, etc. Paper production will be most likely to expand in these plants already established both in the field of kraft and sulphite papers, and may be expected to approximately double in the next 15 years.

Chlorine and Caustic. Chlorine and caustic is at present produced by two companies in the Northwest, both at Tacoma; The Hooder Electrochemical company, and the Pennsylvania Salt company. Both chemicals are heavily used in pulp production and are products of the same electrolytic cell in the electrolysis of brine. There is no doubt that the growing requirements of pulp mills will convince one of these companies or some other group that a plant should be erected near Bonneville to supply this territory. Power is an extremely important item.

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'Bank Night' Legal Test In Offing

The way was opened for a legal test case which may become of increasing interest to Washington and Oregon theater owners and patrons when Mel Reid, owner and operator of the New Gorge theater in Bingen and New Beacon theater in Stevenson, was arrested Thursday on a charge of operating a lottery in connection with "Bank Night."

Reid is said to have been warned that "Bank Night" is illegal, being a lottery, but to have continued it as other localities did.

Oregon's lottery law is similar to Washington's, forbidding making an award to any person on the basis of chance, where that person has paid a consideration to be eligible.

"Bank nights" have been declared lotteries in the past because they have so swelled theater receipts as to cause courts to declare that the patrons paid to become eligible for the prize, rather than to see the pictures.

It is expected that Reid will demand a jury trial on a plea of not guilty.
