

Coos Bay Citizens Seek Strike End

Paralleling but not duplicating efforts of Hood River county growers to bring a measure of order into the coast strike picture, Coos bay citizens have organized a committee to proffer assistance in settlement of the shipping strike.

They state as their sole purpose bringing the pressure of neutral and of affected citizens and groups to bear on all principals to the strike, urging immediate negotiation of all matters pertinent to settlement with the view of an early and effective peace.

They plan to contact administration officials, labor and employers' representatives, coast governors, mayors and citizens' committees.

Recipes

Ideas About Cooking Rabbit

Rabbit is quite a popular food at this season. We offer suggestions from two excellent cooks, both too shy to allow the use of their names or initials.

Probably you all know Grandmother's recipe which begins "First, catch your rabbit, then—"

First Recipe: Cut into pieces, dredge with flour, pepper and salt. Fry until delicate brown. Place in baking pan and pour over meat a can of mushroom soup. Cover and bake in moderate oven until tender.

Second Recipe: Cut and fry pieces of rabbit as above. Place in baking pan. Pour over them water to barely cover, to which is added

2 Tablesp. vinegar

1 Tablesp. salt

1 Tablesp. sugar

Cloves, bay leaves, garlic or onion, to taste

One half lemon, sliced

6 ginger snaps

Cover pan and simmer meat until tender in moderate oven or thicken and brown the gravy on top of stove before serving. This last recipe is of German extraction.

Watermelon Cake

White part:

1 cup granulated sugar

½ cup shortening

1 scant cup milk

¼ teasp. salt

2½ cups flour

3 teasp. baking powder

3 egg whites

1 teasp. vanilla

Sift flour, then measure, add salt and baking powder and sift three times. Cream sugar and shortening. Add milk and flour alternately. Add vanilla and stiffly beaten egg whites.

Red part:

1 cup granulated sugar

½ cup shortening

1 scant cup milk

3 egg yolks

1 teasp. vanilla

½ cup raisins

¼ teasp. salt

2½ cups flour

3 teasp. baking powder

1 teasp. red coloring

Sift flour, then measure, add salt and baking powder and sift 3 times. Cream sugar and shortening and add beaten egg yolks. Add milk and flour alternately, vanilla, red coloring and floured raisins.

Line a deep round pan with oiled paper. Place small amount of red part in center of pan and put all of the white around edge of red part. Then put remainder of red part in center. Bake for 1 hour in moderate oven.

Icing:

2 cups powdered sugar

2 Tablesp. melted butter

Very small amount of boiling water

1 teasp. green coloring

1 teasp. vanilla

Cream butter and sugar, add boiling water until of right consistency to spread. Add green coloring and vanilla. Ice sides and top of cake.
