

Sickness Puts Many Workers On Shelf

Illness continued to shadow the dam area this week, although the sudden run of influenza appears to have been halted.

Approximately 10 per cent of dam workers—probably between 150 and 200 men—are on the sick list, according to Chet Ross, personnel chief for the engineers. The exact number is hard to determine since so many have stayed at home due to the lay-off.

Bonneville grade school was closed down Wednesday morning until next Monday on account of sickness. Charles Robertson, principal, was among those disabled by illness. Roughly 40 per cent of the school children were at home with one sort of ailment or another, said Frank Linton of the Bonneville school board.

Council Gives Beer License To Safeway

A resolution was passed requesting the state liquor commission to reinstate Merrill's tavern's beer license. It is understood the commission refused 1937 licenses throughout the state to establishments where beer drinking and dancing were carried on together. A motion to relieve City Attorney Teunis Wyers of his duties failed for lack of a second.

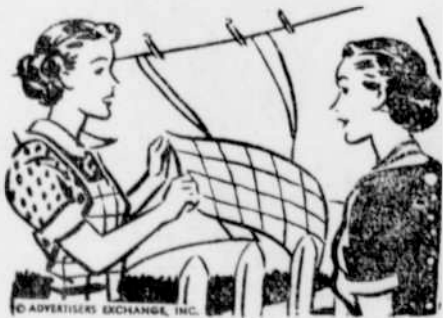

Establishment of new industries in the Portland and Columbia gorge area was linked with Bonneville power legislation by Frank M. Byam, manager of the research department of the Portland chamber of commerce, in his quarterly survey of business conditions issued yesterday.

Big Gates for Spillway Dam Being Built

Gates so huge that even old timers around the dam are a little appalled at their size are being constructed for the main spillway dam by the American Bridge company, subcontractors under the Columbia steel company, which holds the gate contract.

The end flanges of the gates will be a paltry seven feet wide to fit in the gate slots. Twelve of the gates will be 50 feet from end to end, six will be 60 feet. Each gate section will weigh 200 tons.

It is expected the gates will be used on the south side in place of slingloads of five timbers each, at present utilized inside the third-step

cofferdam to still the water while the cofferdam is being placed.

As the gates are completed they will be stored by locking them with the gate latches as high as possible in the slots. From there they can be lowered by the cranes when the engineers are ready to back up water in Cascade Lake.
