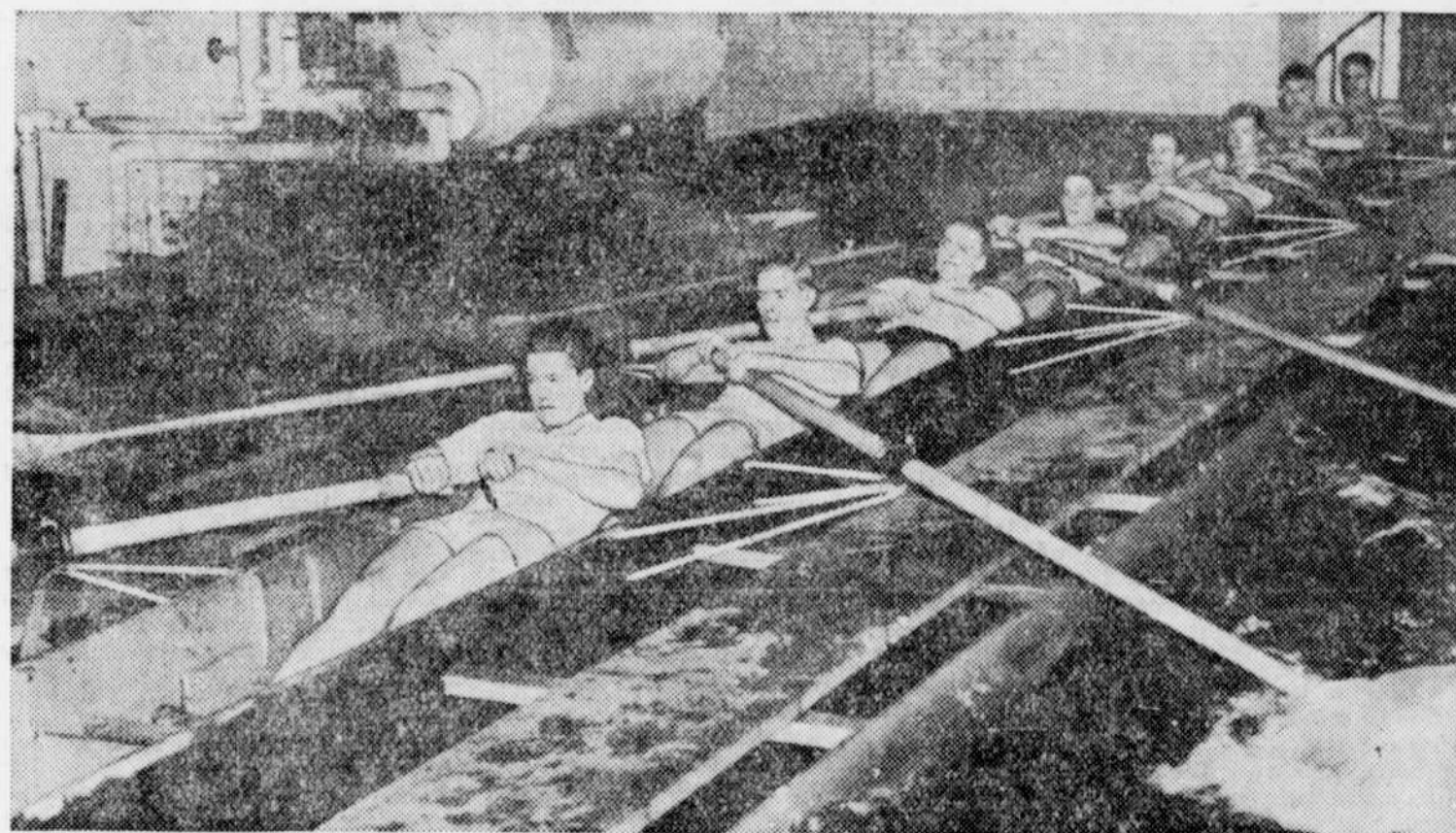

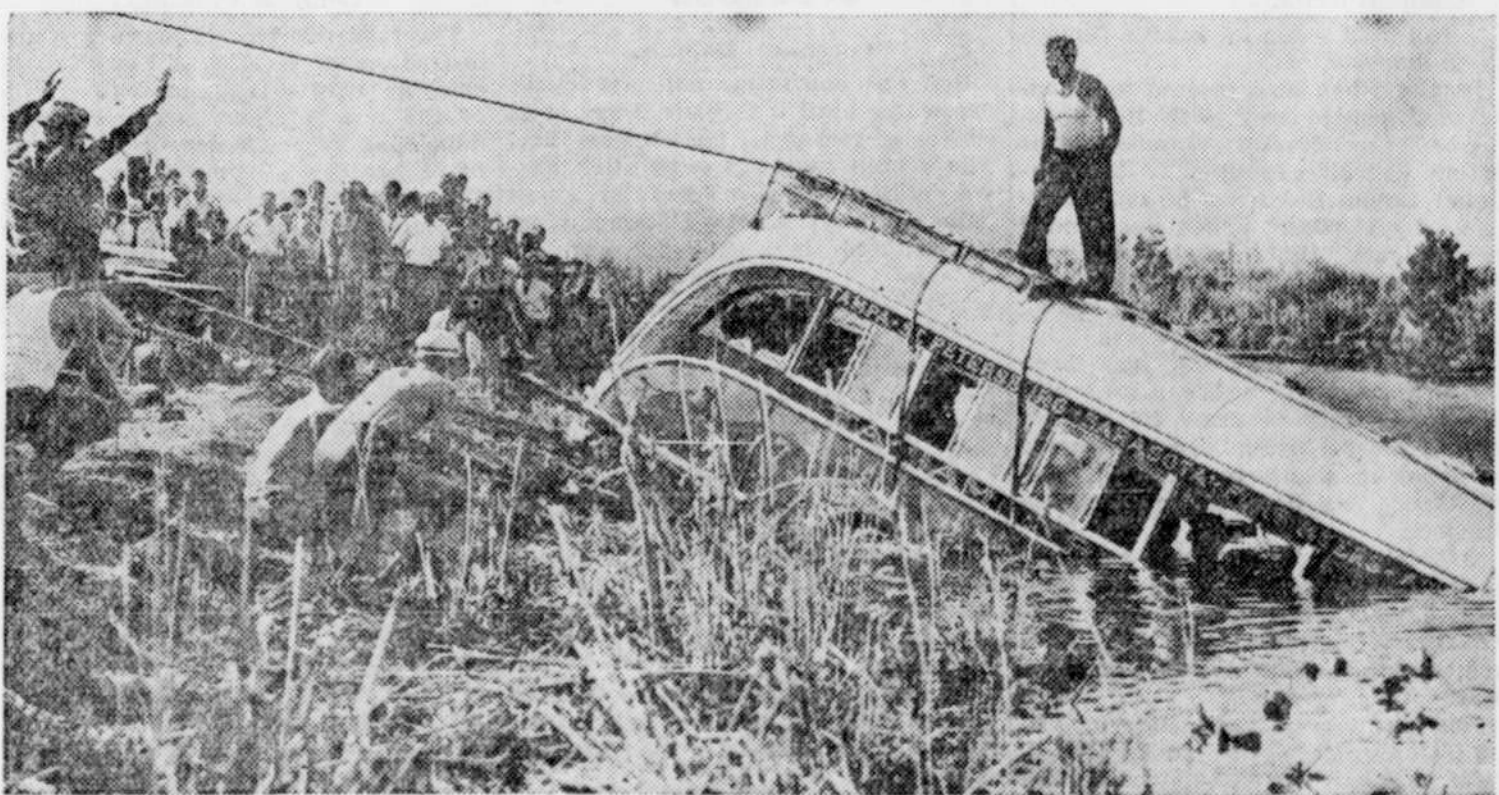

Columbia Crewmen Begin Winter Training Grind



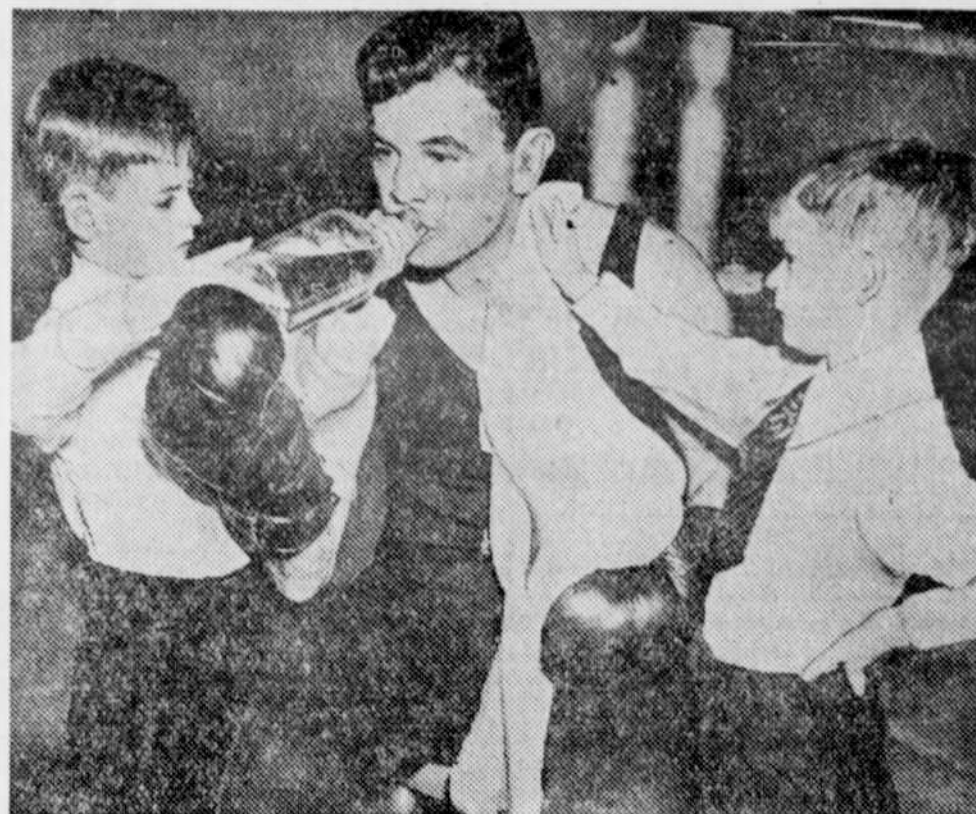

Where Fatal Bus Accident Cost 17 Lives



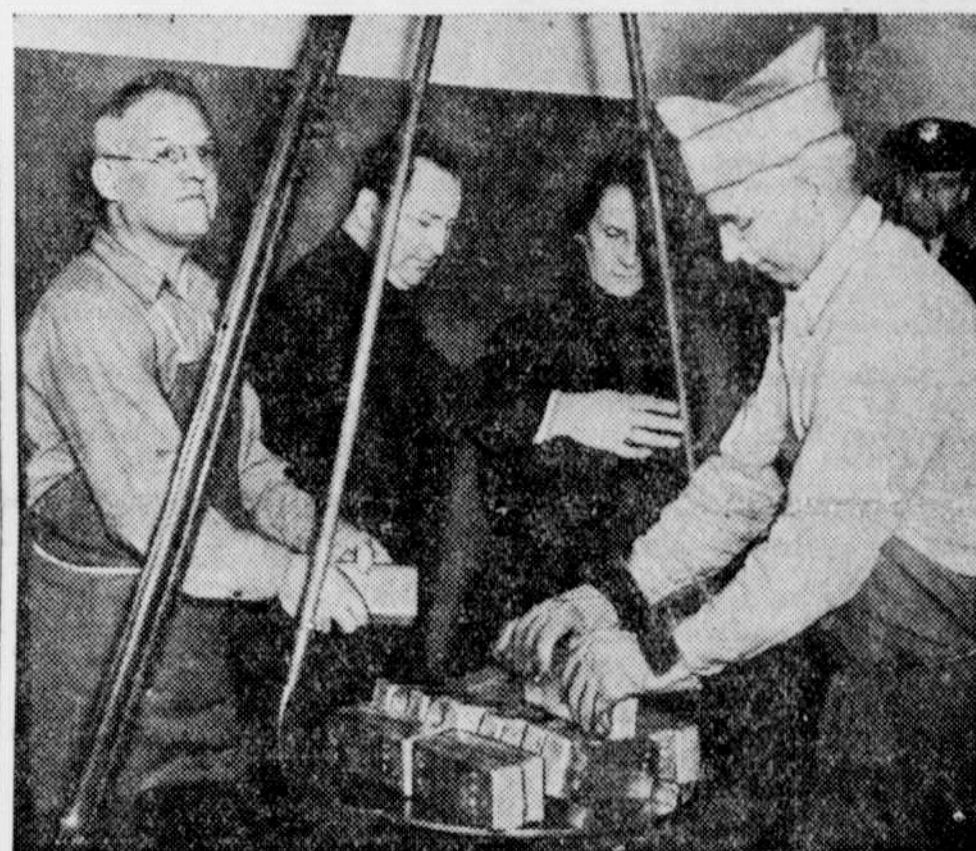
