Where Blast Killed Hundreds of Children



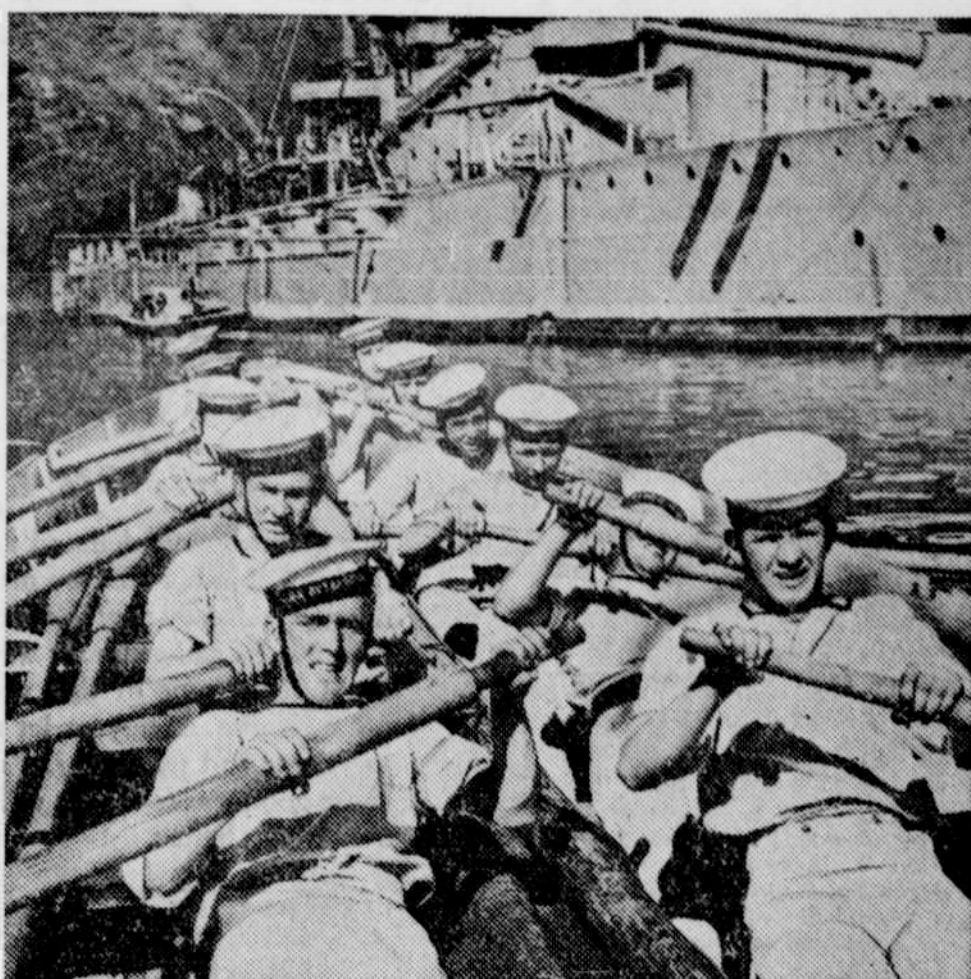
