

At The Roosevelt

A riotous comedy about a bewildered gop, known as "Dud" because of his inexperience with women, who all unconsciously proves himself "Dynamite," is unfolded in the Paramount picture "Lady Be Careful," which will play Friday and Saturday at the Roosevelt theater.

The film features Lew Ayres as the sailor whose nickname is switched from "Dud" to "Dynamite," and Mary Carlisle as a Panama City dancer who is the cause of it all. Larry Crabbe appears as a Marine, boastful of his many conquests, who finds himself outdone by the modest Ayres.

Benny Baker, of radio fame, aids in packing the yarn with laughs. Baker, himself formerly a radio stooge for Lou Holtz, has a stooge in the picture, in the person of Joe "Frankenstein" Plotski, platter-faced comic.

Dorothy Parker, Alan Campbell and Harry Ruskin cooperated in turning out the frothy dialogue of "Lady Be Careful," and J. T. Reed, ace Paramount director, paced the story at a speed suited to its farce lines.

Kollitch Kids

A half-dozen of the screen's out-

standing comedians, aided by a cast of Hollywood's most charming young players, contrive to make of "College Holiday," which is scheduled at the Roosevelt theater Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, one of the funniest, gayest and most hilarious comedies with music to reach the screen this season.

With a madcap story from the pen of J. P. McEvoy to work upon, Jack Benny, George Burns and Gracie Allen, Mary Boland and Martha Raye go through their paces in one continuous howl of laughter. Marsha Hunt, Eleanor Whitney, Lief Erickson, Johnny Downs, Olympe Bradna, Louis DaPron, Ben Blue and Etienne Girardot, are in charge of the romance and gayety. Splendid music, gorgeous settings and a chorus of Filmdom's most beautiful girls round out this perfect bill of entertainment.

"College Holiday" deals with a bankrupt hotel and the efforts of Benny, its press agent, to save it. When he runs into Miss Boland and Girardot, a couple of scatterbrains who believe in scientific mating, his troubles are solved. He gets them to take it over, ostensibly to try out their theories. Benny brings a number of college boys and girls to the place and the fun begins. Gracie Allen, as Girardot's daughter, who is even more scatterbrained than her Pop, has a way of telling who will make the ideal mate for whom, and she proceeds to put her notions into

practice. It winds up in a crescendo of gags and music.

Martha Raye, as one of the college girls upon whom the experiment is tried, outdoes herself with the type of comedy which has made her famous. George Burns is there as the usual "fall guy" for Gracie's inanities.

The music in "College Holiday" rates as tops. Especially worthy of note are "I Adore You" and "A Rhyme for Love," both of which have all the ingredients of sure-fire hits, and "Sweetheart Waltz," "So What?" and "Who's That Knocking at My Heart?" all of which are catchy, tuneful, gay and beautiful. The music was written by Ralph Rainger and Leo Robin, and Bert Lane and Ralph Freed.

More Problems

As a novel, Sinclair Lewis' "Dodsworth" was a best-seller. Adapted to the stage by Sidney Howard, with Walter Huston in the title role, it was a smash hit and ran almost two years on Broadway. Now, translated into celluloid by the same writer, with Huston again playing Sam Dodsworth and given a magnificent production by Samuel Goldwyn, "Dodsworth" has found its ideal form. Combining all the best features of the book and the play, and adding several of its own, "Dodsworth" will come to the screen of the Roosevelt theater Wednesday and Thursday as the finest piece of entertainment we have seen in many seasons.

Brilliantly acted by a perfect cast, headed by Huston, Ruth Chatterton, Paul Lukas, Mary Astor and David Niven, this absorbing film tells the story of Sam Dodsworth, a hard-working, successful middle-Western business man who retires to travel.

Sam looks to Europe as a place to rest and dabble in culture, but to his pretty, selfish and adored wife Fran, (Ruth Chatterton), it means one last fling at romance before facing middle age.

"Dodsworth" has been brilliantly directed by William Wyler and Richard Day's magnificent sets and Omar Kiam's breath-takingly lovely costumes are in keeping with the smart, lavish tone of the production. "Dodsworth" should top your "must see" list. The film is released through United Artists.
