Murder on the fog-bound moor, a kidnapping, the machinations of a counterfeit band, and the imprisonment of a beautiful woman in a house of mystery, are a few things "Bulldog Drummond" has to solve in "Bulldog Drummond Escapes," the latest in the breezy series of detective films, which will play Friday and Saturday at the Roosevelt theatre.
