

County Will Note Child Health Day

Child Health day will be recognized May 1 in all parts of the nation with appropriate programs and completion of projects.

In Hood River county the health nurse, Miss Bessie Williams, assisted by all dentists in the county, has completed a dental survey through free clinics for children. The dentists found the condition of children's teeth averages noticeably better than usual in this county.

The county health association has set aside enough money for corrective dental work where most urgently needed. The corrective work will be done locally following the close of school.

During May immunization clinics will be held for all children over six months of age, whether they are in school or not. Children obtaining their parents' consent will be immunized to diphtheria and smallpox.

Child Health Day was made official by act of congress and presidential proclamation. It is sponsored by the United States Bureau of Public Health and the state board of health. Posters and literature have been distributed through the local group.
