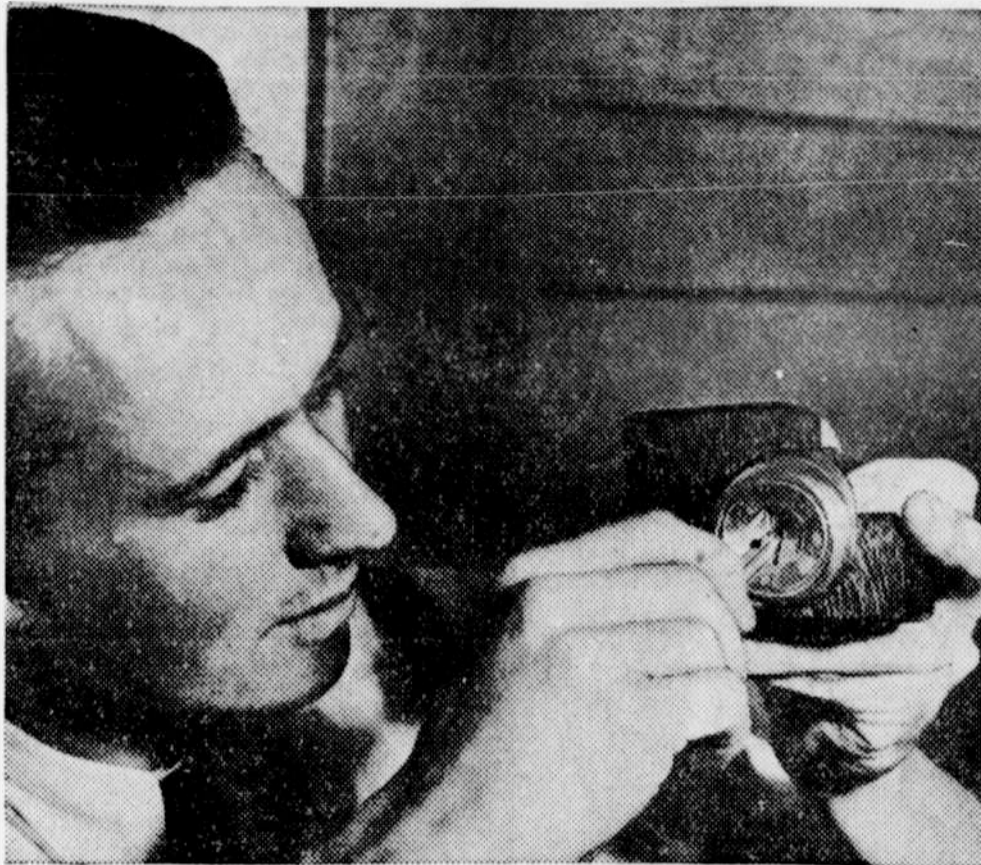
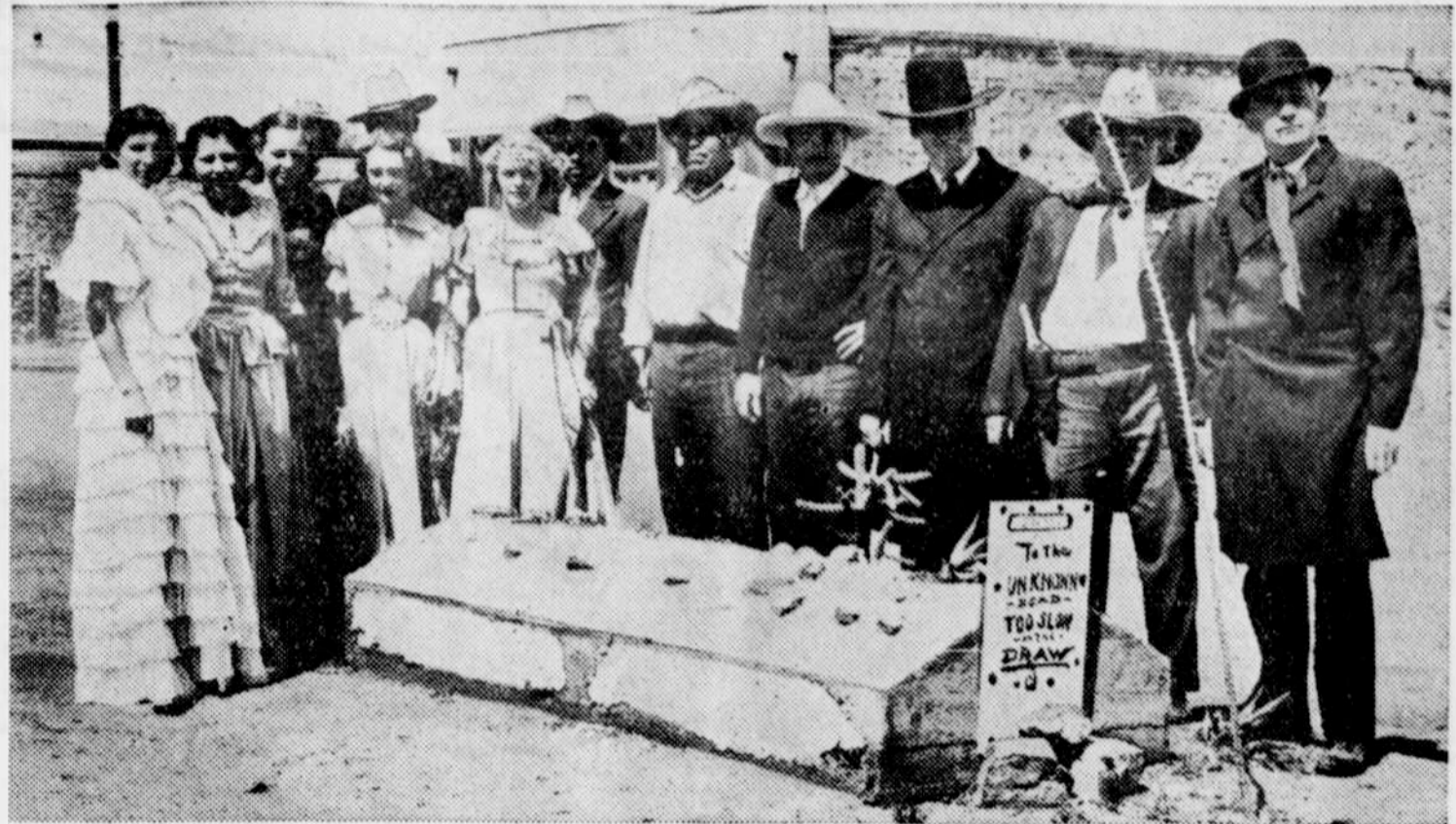


Invents "Anti-Jitter" Keyhole



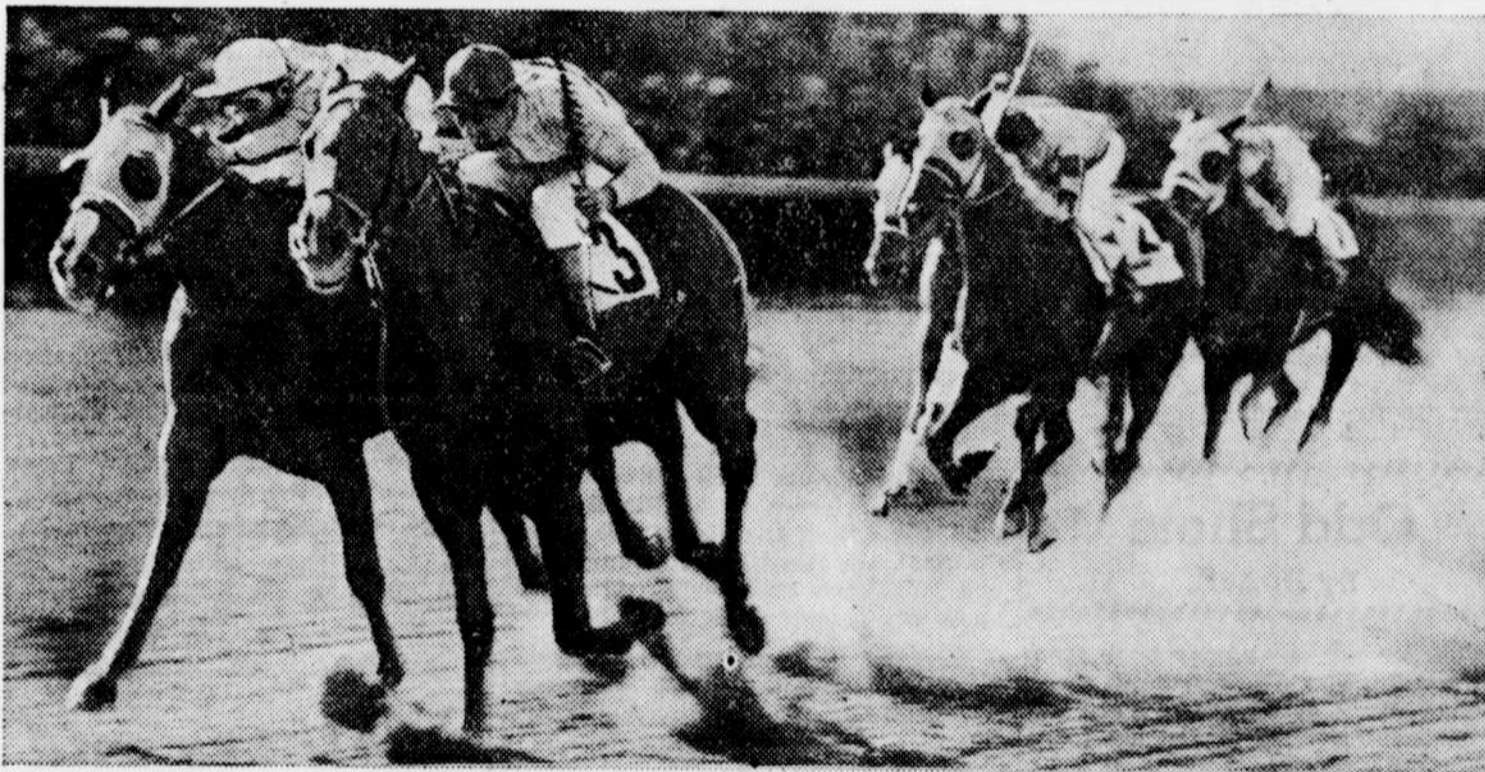
