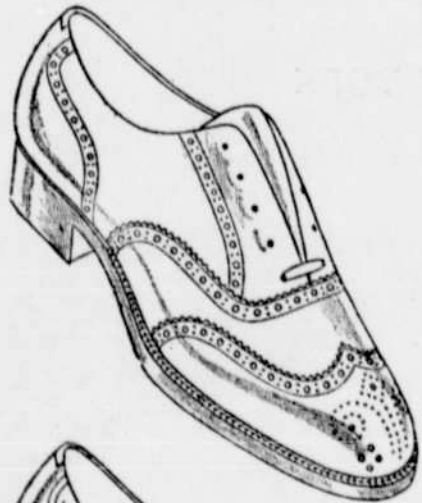
Good Catches
