At The Roosevelt

Tingling with the salt spray of adventure, a stirring action film is presented to picture-goers in RKO-Radio's "Night Waitress," which will play at the Roosevelt theatre Friday and Saturday.

An unusual type of mystery plot forms the background against which a girl's romance is painted, and with a cast headed by Margot Grahame and Gordon Jones, this offering furnishes plenty of excitement.

San Francisco's famous embarcadero, the waterfront section running south from Telegraph Hill, forms the colorful setting for most of the scenes. Miss Grahame, in the title role of a waitress in a cafe area, finds herself innocently involved in a mystery which baffles both the police and a gang of crooks.

Jones, the former football star who plays his first leading role as the sailor-hero, is also involved in the affair, and his efforts to beat the police and the crooks to the secret and at the same time save Miss Grahame, give rise to the many suspense-packed situations.

Low Landers, who directed, and Joseph Henry Steele, the producer, have maintained both the romantic interest and excitement at a high pitch. Miss Grahame's work again proves the fine versatility of this charming British actress, and young Jones turns in an excellent performance.

Vinton Haworth, who recently played in "Without Orders" again scores with his role as a crook, and Donald Barry, Arthur Loft, Marc Laurence, Otto Yamaoka, Billy Gilbert, and other favorites are uniformly good.

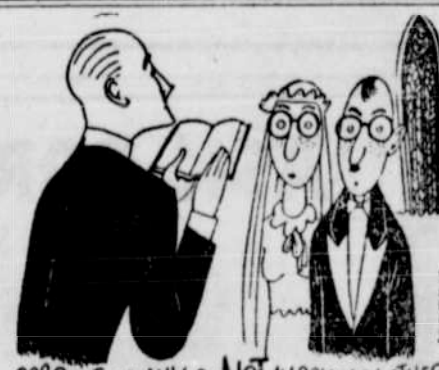
