Secondary Road May Get Gravel

The state highway commission is understood to be favorably disposed toward letting a \$15,000 contract for graveling the secondary state highway this side of Dee north from the termination of the blacktop surfacing laid last year, it was learned here this week. The commission at its next meeting will decide whether or not it will advertise the contract for bids.

Erection of a bridge across Hood River, extending east from Cascade street at or near its intersection with Second street, apparently is in line for early action. It is probable the bridge will be of creosoted wood construction.

This bridge will be the first link, in that vicinity, of the new water-grade highway up the gorge. The structure will be designed chiefly to provide a takeoff for a new approach to the Hood River-White Salmon bridge, since the present approach under the railroad bridge will be submerged for considerable periods every year following completion of the dam.

The new bridge will pass over First street with a clearance of 18 to 20 feet, it is understood. Details of the crossing over the Mount Hood railroad tracks have not been fully worked out.

An aerial photographer spent part of last week making shots of the topography along the proposed super-highway route between Hood River and Mosier.

The state highway commission has agreed to open the Mount Hood loop highway soon, work being now under way. A snow-go will probably make short work of the opening.

Clearing of the loop was requested by the Hood River chamber of commerce in a recent letter to the commission. Local employees of the highway department and many local residents have also sought the loop's opening.
