

Dalles Plans 4th of July Celebration

THE DALLES, ORE.—It is not just another Fourth of July celebration, that being staged July 3, 4, and 5 at The Dalles this year. While it will feature many of the old-fashioned staples, athletic events, dances and whatnot, the highlight attraction will be a Pageant of Progress parade, a two-mile string of illuminated floats and historical pageant, depicting three periods of development of the mid-Columbia country. It will not be a mere The Dalles pageant, but will embrace a wide strip of this area, the nucleus of development of the Inland Empire.

Four historic periods will be exemplified by the floats, which will be given vivid coloring with electric lighting effects. Exploration will be featured by a Lewis and Clark float, one showing an old Covered Wagon and others. The Exploitation period will be made graphic by floats illustrative of the prospector, pack train, old freight wagon and Pony Express.

The Expansion period will be shown by floats depicting such modern day evolutionary development as Bonneville, power and every phase of industry. "And," says Mayor H. E. Willerton, who says the city authorities will make every provision for the comfort of guests, "you will find that we think Jim Marshall was having an Oriental poppy dream, when he wrote an article in Collier's Weekly about Bonneville, entitled 'A Dam of Doubt.' A large part of the exercises will be held in the warehouses on top of the 1200-foot dock, which the port of The Dalles has

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built to greet ocean ships when Bonneville dam is completed. They are bigger than horse corrals and are always cool, due to the breezes blowing over the water. Just come and you'll find we are not doubters."

A climax of the periods is reached in floats that depict "Anticipation." They show various great projects, which are already outlined for the mid-Columbia and eastern Oregon and which farseeing citizens of all our communities can now envision.

A comic section will include a long string of the oldest automobiles that can be found in a radius of 100 miles. The sponsors of the celebration have secured the services of C. C. Struble, widely known designer of Spokane, and crews of carpenters, decorators and electricians are already at work on 30 floats already authorized and sponsored by business folk and industrial plants.

The parade will occur twice, the first time on Saturday night at 10 o'clock; the second, on Monday afternoon.

Other unique features will be a Marathon race from Dufur, 20 miles away, ending at Amaton field, The Dalles high school's gridiron, a water carnival on the Columbia and fireworks. The fireworks will occur Sunday night.

At The Roosevelt

"Hopalong Cassidy," hero to millions of outdoor action fans, is a villain in the latest of his film adventures, "Borderland," which is scheduled at the Roosevelt theatre Friday and Saturday.

As a real dyed-in-the-wool villain, who hates babies, hobnobs with cattle rustlers, belongs to a gang of bandits and hangs out in the lowest joint in the border town of El Rio, "Hoppy" breaks the heart of his pal, Johnny Nelson, and completely bewilders "Windy," his loyal old side-kick.

But "Hopalong" has a reason for his villainy and it makes "Borderland" one of the most thrilling and fast moving of the popular series of Westerns from the pen of Clarence E. Mulford. There's a bandit to be apprehended who is entirely too slick to be taken by the usual methods of the Texas Rangers. It is up to "Hoppy" to become an outlaw himself in order to establish contact with "The Fox," and the best way he can accomplish this is to get himself arrested on a faked charge and to go "bad" in a big way.

"Hoppy" succeeds in getting the bandit in one of those hard-riding, hard-fighting climaxes that have made all the "Hopalong Cassidy" pictures exciting outdoor adventures.

"Hopalong" is played by William Boyd. Jimmy Ellison is on hand again as Johnny, and George Hayes is "Windy." Stephen Morris turns in an excellent performance in a dual role and Charlene Wyatt, the little girl of "Valiant Is the Word for Carrie," is also in the cast.

Hooded Terror

On the very day—almost at the same hour—that Judge Joseph A. Moynahan of Detroit passed sentence in the Black Legion case, the exact thing was being enacted on a Hollywood stage, with Samuel Hinds, character actor, as the Judge.

The film version of "Black Legion," to show Wednesday and Thursday at the Roosevelt theatre, is a Warner Bros. production based on the activities of the society of that name, and the big trial scenes are the climax of the story, with Humphrey Bogart as the guilty night rider.

The coincidence of the time is heightened by the fact the words of the screen judge in passing sentence were almost identical with those used in Judge Moynahan's indignant castigation.

Both the real judge and the actor judge uttered scathing exhortations of secret societies that stir up racial and religious hatred among American citizens.

"Black Legion" is a daring and thrilling melodrama based upon the actual operations of the secret, hooded, night-riding order which terrorized Michigan recently.

The cast includes, besides Bogart, Dick Foran, Ann Sheridan, Erin O'Brien-Moore, Helen Flint, Joseph Sawyer, Dickie Jones and others.

Starry-Eyed

Hilarious comedy is provided by "When's Your Birthday?" which is scheduled Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at the Roosevelt theatre, with Joe E. Brown as funmaker-in-chief.

Brown is seen as an "occasional" prize fighter who adopts this means of paying for a course in astrology. Later he refuses to marry his sweetheart, Suzanne Kaaren, because she has selected a date which conflicts with the favorable aspect of his birth planet. He lands a job as a fortune-telling astrologer in a midway concession operated by Fred Keating, where

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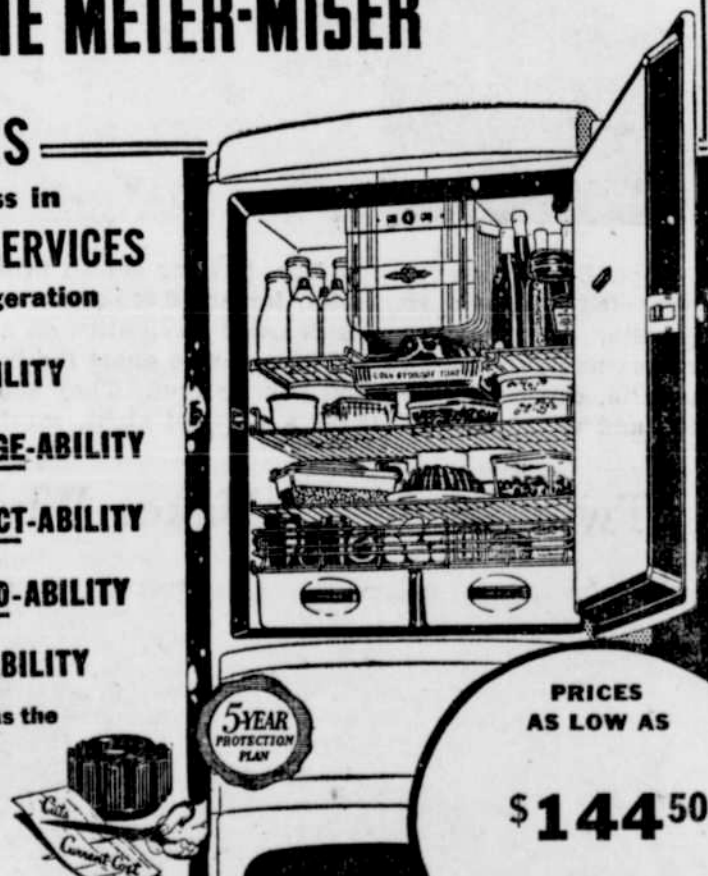
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
