Friday and Saturday

William Powell and Kay Francis have been co-starred in a number of pictures, each of which has met high acclaim from both the public and the press. REPAIRS UNDER WAY AT UNIVERSITY OF OREGON

University of Oregon, Eugene, July 1—When new and old students arrive on the campus of the University of Oregon next fall they will find the university president and his staff in new quarters in Johnson hall, law students will have commodious quarters in the old library and the Oregon museum of anthropology will be located on the main floor of Condon hall in the old reserve library space, it was announced here this week when plans for remodeling and repairs on the campus, costing approximately \$33,000, were made public by Dr. C. Valentine Boyer, university president.

The work was authorized by the state board of higher education following a careful survey made by Louis Traver, building expert. An expenditure of approximately \$2500 will be necessary for the remodeling. Remodeling of the old library will cost approximately \$13,000.

Huge McArthur court, one of the finest athletic pavilions in the country, will have a new roof over the domed portion, at a cost of approximately \$2400. The tunnel to be constructed for the men's dormitory, at a cost of about \$3,000, will remove all possibility of any unsanitary condition arising from drainage, it was

A few good catches were made at Lost lake, including a number of two-pounders. The road up there is fine now, but anglers are warned that if they wish to obtain a cabin on the lake, reservations must be made many weeks in advance.

Fishing has been generally good in central Oregon. A few fair catches have been made on the Deschutes. The Crooked river is the only stream in that region known to be muddy now.

An international trap shooting meet will be held in San Francisco during the 1939 World's Fair there.

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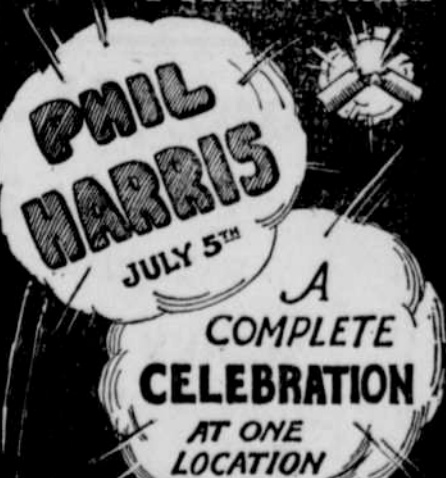
