Dodo Could Not Fly

The dodo was a large bird discovered by the early voyagers to Mauritius, notes a writer in London Answers Magazine. It was equipped with a large beak but very small wings—so small that, like the penguins we know, it could not fly, and was a very slow mover. For this reason it fell an easy victim to hunters. It was finally exterminated towards the end of the Seventeenth century, this process probably being helped along by the importation of pigs, which devoured the eggs which the dodo laid in nests on the ground.
